State Fair entertainment line-up set

Jose Feliciano, country singer Jeannie C. Riley and the comedy team of Skiles and Henderson lead the entertainment lineup announced this week for the Oregon State Fair.

Fair Director Ron Ingberg said on-stage entertainment during the 112th edition of the fair will be in the 3,200-seat Salem Armory. Admission will be free for those who have already gained admittance to the fair.

Entertainment will be presented daily at 2 and 8 p.m.

Opening the schedule on Saturday, Aug. 27, will be Feliciano, a two-time Grammy award winner. He is perhaps best known for his 1968 recording of "Light My Fire."

Skiles and Henderson, a family-oriented comedy team based in California, will appear Sunday, Aug. 28. Riley, best known for her single, "Harper Valley PTA," is scheduled for Aug. 29.

Clay Hart and Sally Flynn, a duo formerly with the Lawrence Welk show, will perform Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 30 and 31.

Ray Charles will perform Thursday, Sept. 1; Freddy Fender, Sept. 2; Flash Cadillac

and the Continental Kids, Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 3 and 4. Monday, Sept. 5, Labor Day, will be Bluegrass Day, with performances by local bluegrass bands, Dr. Corn's Bluegrass Remedy and The Sawtooth Mountain Boys.

Clay Hart and Sally Flynn are a singing duo who emphasize a folksy sound. Ray Charles, blues singer and pianist, has been called by

Frank Sinatra, "the only genius in our business." Freddy Fender sings in a style which combines the country and bred background, dubbed by some as "Tex-Mex" music.

Flash Cadillac and the Continental Kids sing 50s rock and roll with a difference. To their spoofs on the old 50s favorites, complete with exaggerated choreography, Flash Cadillac adds the more

complex harmonies and instrumentation of the 70s.

In addition to the on-stage armory entertainment, the fair will present the Albert Ostermaier show with his Lipizzan horses, daily with the horse show and rodeo. The Malukova High Wire Act, featuring high-up performances, will be shown twice daily on weekdays, with three shows daily on weekends.

Entry deadlines near for fair

Clackamas County Fair exhibitors are being reminded by Fair Manager Jerry Mickelsen that entry deadlines in certain categories require submissions prior to opening of the fair.

Exhibitors planning to show cattle (both dairy and beef), sheep, and swine must submit their entries prior to 5 p.m., Monday, July 25, an official Clackamas County Fair entry forms.

Entries should be mailed to the Chief Entry Clerk, P.O. Box 658, Canby, Ore., 97013. Entries will be limited to the capacity of the barns, with earliest

entries received given priority on space. Entry fees must accompany submissions.

Poultry entries must be submitted no later than 9 p.m., Thursday, Aug. 11, and rabbits by midnight, Monday, Aug. 8.

Deadline date for agricultural crops, floral exhibits and hobby hall is 8 p.m., Monday, Aug. 15. Textile entries will be accepted from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m., Sunday, Aug. 14, and Domestic Science Department entries from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. the same day.

Photography exhibits, with entry form and fee, may be left from Tuesday, July 26, up to shop closing times, Tuesday, Aug. 9, at any of the following stations: Citizens Photo, 511 S.E. Morrison St., Portland; Snappy's, Oregon City Shopping Center (open until 9 p.m. Monday through Friday); Mr. Pix Camera Store, Main Street, Oregon City; or Housen

Photography, 370 N.W. 1st, Canby (closed Mondays).

Entries submitted by mail should be addressed to the Photography Salon, Clackamas County Fair, Canby, Ore. 97013.

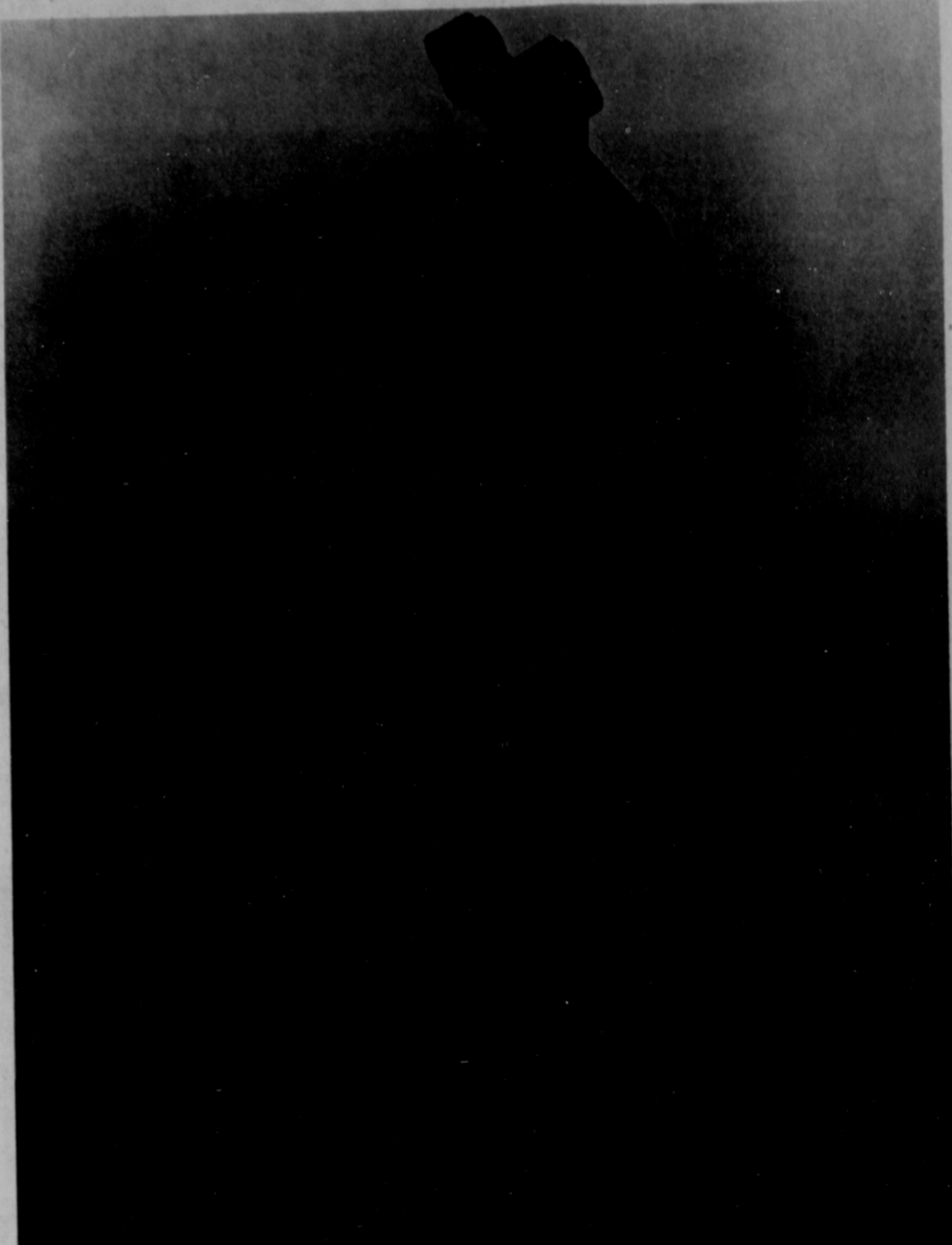
They must be mailed in time to arrive at the fairgrounds not later than Tuesday, Aug. 9. Return postage must be included.
