



A national landmark

FORTY-YEAR-OLD Timberline Lodge, here seen without its winter coat of snow, has been designated a national landmark under the U.S. Department of Interior's "National Historic Landmarks Program." The announcement was made Monday by George F. Emery, chief of the Historical Site Survey Division of the National Park Service. Timberline will be one of the youngest of the 1,500 buildings and sites protected by the program. "Unlike the National Register for Historic Places, to qualify for the Landmarks Program a building must be important to the history of the nation and it must have significance for the country as a whole," said Emery. A bronze plaque and commemorative scroll from Cecil D. Andrus, secretary for the U.S. Department of the Interior, will recognize the occasion.

Contract proposed

The Sandy City Council has asked Alder Creek Water Co. to sign an agreement outlining uses of the city's intake for the Alder Creek. Sandy city attorney Jack Hammond told the Post that an attorney for Alder Creek Co. President Red Bennett is reviewing the proposed contract. If Bennett, the owner of the water company, does not ok the contract within the next ten days, the

council has voted to discontinue the practice of letting Bennett tap Sandy water when his lines are out of order.

Monday's action was taken after Bennett expressed dissatisfaction with the construction of the Alder Creek water system designed for city users. Bennett said the city's project was interfering with service to his customers.

Under the proposed contract Bennett's company would provide water to Alder Creek Water users during times when maintenance on the city's dam or intake muddied the water supply.

1 teaspoon paprika
Beat together cottage cheese, ham, onion and paprika until fairly smooth. Chill. Serve with vegetable dippers. Yield: 1 1/4 cups. 16 calories per tablespoon.

Shrimp Stroganoff
Saucepan, 1 1/2 quart
3 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon dill weed
1 cup water
1 beef bouillon cube
1 can (2 oz.) sliced mushrooms
2 cups cooked shrimp
1 cup plain yogurt
In saucepan melt butter; add onion and cook until tender. Stir in flour and dill weed. Gradually add water, then bouillon cube and mushrooms with liquid. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add shrimp and heat 5 minutes. Stir in yogurt; heat to serving temperature. Serve over asparagus spears. Dogs poisoned

A black cloud is hanging over residents of Zig Zag Village after the apparent poisoning of at least four dogs last weekend.

The first death was reported about 11 p.m. Saturday and the last about midnight Sunday night, said vacation home owner Rolf Glerum.

Glerum, an account executive for Rocky-March Public Relations Inc., in Portland, prepared a newsletter for Zig Zag Village residents on Tuesday to warn them of the deaths.

"We have no idea, of course, what person or persons did such an abominable act nor what the motive could possibly be," he said. He urged village homeowners to keep their pets and small children within sight while in the area.

Glerum said one person in the village reported that a "tuna-like" substance containing "suspicious looking black flecks" was found on several Zig Zag

Village roads. The material was sent in for laboratory analysis and the Clackamas County Sheriff's office has been alerted to the problem.

Glerum urged local residents, to report any suspicious persons in the area.

"Finally, if you should discover any unidentified food particles or pieces of meat on the ground, please call the Clackamas County Sheriff's office before you destroy it," Glerum said.

The Zig Zag Village Board of Directors has offered a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person responsible for the poisoning.

Glerum said his dog was not killed over the weekend, even though the animal was in contact with some of the dogs that died.

"I'm just sick about this," he told The Post. "This is a very sad experience for us all."

Flashing lights debut

Citizen concern and accident problems are the reasons flashing yellow lights have been installed at six Highway 26 intersections between Sandy and Gresham.

Ron Failmezer, regional traffic engineer of the Oregon State Highway Division's transportation department, said the lights were installed under the Highway Safety Act.

He cited contract estimates of approximately

\$7,000 per location. "Ninety percent of the cost was paid by the federal government with the state picking up the other 10 percent," he said.

The lights at Palmquist, Hillyard, Anderson, Stone, Haley and Kelso road intersections were approved by the Oregon State Transportation Commission, Failmezer said.

The following reported accident statistics were given by Failmezer for each

- intersection from Jan. 1, 1971 through August, 1975:
- Palmquist Road: 16 accidents, 27 injuries and 1 fatality.
- Hillyard Road: 7 accidents and 10 injuries.
- Anderson Road: 4 accidents and 5 injuries.
- Stone Road: 8 accidents, 8 injuries and 3 fatalities.
- Haley Road: 5 accidents and 5 injuries.
- Kelso Road: 5 accidents, 6 injuries and 2 fatalities.

Urban county board holds meeting

The first meeting of the Urban County Policy Board for the Community Development Block Grant was held Jan. 6 at the Far West Federal Savings building in Oregon City.

Representatives from Clackamas County and the various municipal jurisdictions attended the two hour work session which kicked off planning and programming activities necessary to facilitate the

1978 application to Housing and Urban Development.

The main topics of discussion included a proposed citizen participation plan drafted by Ardis Stevenson of the Extension Service and the housing assistance plan. The plan describes needs and proposed areas of assistance relative to housing, said David Cooper of the Housing and Redevelopment Agency. Strategies were discussed

and outlined pertinent to development of a comprehensive three year plan. Cooper said an annual development program was discussed. Both are required for the Community Development Grant application.

The meeting, chaired by Jono Hildner, administrator of the Department of Human Resources for Clackamas County, will be followed by a second on Jan. 20.
