

Sheriff promises increased service

Clackamas County Sheriff John Renfro sees Estacada's merger with Clackamas County police services as a chance for "better services for less money."

Effective July 1, the 73-year-old Estacada police department will contract annually with the county force for services. Only items up for renegotiation will be salaries of employees working in what will become an "expanded Estacada precinct" which will include all of Eagle Creek east toward the Mt. Hood region.

Renfro said the salaries of present employees would be brought to the level of employees in Clackamas County, "which means an increase."

Under the one-year agreement, Renfro said, a precinct will be established at Estacada City Hall. Boring, Sandy and Estacada police will be working from that precinct.

"Travel time is a big advantage," said Renfro. "Response time should be cut to five or ten minutes. Back-up cars will also be available to help."

Estacada will turn over its two patrol cars and "connecting equipment" to the sheriff's office, according to the agreement.

Renfro sees no problem with Estacada officers assimilating into the Clackamas County system. "Supervisors will instruct the deputies unfamiliar with ordinances."

Under the new system, Renfro said, "There will be at least 17 policemen on a 24-hour shift. Either Sandy or Estacada City Hall will coordinate activities."

Either party can terminate the contract with 90 days notice, Estacada city officials were told. If Estacada should move to end the agreement, the city would be required by state statute to hire those employees working in the Estacada precinct.

Fawbush vies for re-election

District 56 Rep. Wayne Fawbush formally threw his hat in the political arena on Tuesday and filed for re-election to his house seat.

"Although over 75 percent of the proposals I made in the last campaign were enacted into legislation in 1977, one term was not adequate to accomplish everything I hoped to do," said the 34-year-old Democrat.

"Tax reform, incentives for the development of alternate forms of energy, and a reduction of government interference in our daily lives are issues which the next session of the legislature should deal with and I want to be in Salem to make them happen."

Fawbush is the only candidate for the Democratic nomination to the house seat. His apparent challenger in the November election will be former State Rep. Paul Walden, who was ousted from his seat by Fawbush in a close 1976 race.

Walden, 60, is owner-manager of KIH Radio Station in Hood River.

Fawbush is a photographer and owns a small orchard in the Hood River area with his wife, Gloria. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in political science from the University of Oregon. After serving as an officer in the Air Force, he returned to Hood River.

The incumbent said tax reform will be one of his major goals in 1979.

"There has been a lot of talk about returning the state surplus as a tax rebate. I believe that a surplus should not be collected in the first place."

Fawbush said he is drafting legislation to adjust personal income taxes to eliminate the surplus caused by inflation at the end of budget period. In addition, he also intends to expand sunset legislation to force a review of numerous tax loopholes.

"We must limit the amount of income tax revenue available to the state. I see that as the only effective way to limit the growth of state government."

Other areas in which Fawbush says

he wants to take action include:

- Increasing the power of the state ombudsman to control run-away state regulatory agencies.
- Requiring the state to lead the way in the utilization of alternate forms of energy.
- Expanding research within our state universities for practical uses of solar, geo-thermal, and wind energy in Oregon.
- Requiring a paperwork impact statement on each proposed piece of legislation so that legislators will know beforehand what manner of bureaucratic red tape will result.

During his first term in office Fawbush served as vice-chairman of the Business and Consumer Affairs Committee and as a member of the Revenue and School Finance Committee. He also was one of seven members of the House Democratic Leadership Committee.

Fawbush said he plans to conduct a door-to-door campaign as he did in the last election.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received on behalf of School District No. 46, Clackamas County, Oregon until 11:30 o'clock a.m. (Prevaling Pacific Time) on March 28, 1978, at the offices of Ragen & Roberts, Lawyers, Suite 3317, First National Bank Tower, Portland, Oregon, 97201, at which time they will be publicly opened and announced.

The bids shall be considered and acted upon by the Board of the District at its meeting to be held on March 28, 1978, commencing at 12:00 o'clock a.m. (Prevaling Pacific Time).

ISSUE: THREE MILLION FOUR HUNDRED EIGHTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$3,485,000) consisting of 697 coupon bonds in denominations of FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$5,000), all dated April 1, 1978.

INTEREST RATE: Maximum not to exceed a net effective rate of eight percent (8%) per annum, the first interest payment due on October 1, 1978 and semiannually thereafter on April 1 and October 1 of each year. Bidders must specify the interest rate or rates which the bonds hereby offered for sale shall bear. The bids shall comply with the following conditions: (1) each interest rate specified in any bid must be in multiples of 1/8th of one percent (1/8%); (2) no bond shall bear more than one rate of interest, no interest payment shall be evidenced by more than one coupon; (3) no bond shall bear more than one rate of interest; (4) all bonds maturing at any one time shall bear the same rate of interest; (5) the difference between the highest and lowest rates bid shall not exceed two percent (2%); and (6) rates bid for bonds maturing 1996 through 1998, inclusive, shall not be less than rates bid for the immediately preceding maturity.

MATURITIES: The bonds shall mature serially in numerical order on April 1 in each year as follows:

REGISTRATION: The bonds will be issued in bearer form with no option for registration.

REDEMPTION: The District reserves the right to redeem any or all of the bonds then outstanding in inverse numerical order on April 1, 1988 and on any interest payment date thereafter at par, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption. Notice of any such intended redemption shall be given by mailing a notice thereof to Moody's Investors Service, Inc., and Standard & Poor's Corporation, New York, New York, not less than thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date and by publication of such notice at least once, in a newspaper specializing in financial matters published in the City of Portland, Oregon, and in a newspaper of general circulation in Clackamas County, Oregon. Interest on any bond or bonds so called for redemption shall cease on such redemption date unless the same are not redeemed upon presentation made pursuant to such call.

PAYMENT: Principal and interest are payable, either at maturity or upon earlier redemption, in lawful money of the United States at the office of the Treasurer, Clackamas County, Oregon City, Oregon.

PURPOSE: The bonds were authorized at a special election held within the District on January 10, 1978, to authorize bonds for school buildings.

SECURITY: The bonds of this issue are general obligation bonds of the District. The District has covenanted to levy an ad valorem tax annually to pay bond principal and interest as they respectively come due.

LEGAL OPINION: The approving opinion of Ragen & Roberts, Lawyers, of Portland, Oregon, will be provided at no cost to the purchaser, and will be printed on the bonds at the expense of the District.

TAX EXEMPT STATUS: Interest on the bonds, in the opinion of bond counsel, is exempt from taxation by the United States under present federal income tax laws and from personal income taxation by the State of Oregon under present state law.

BEST BID: The bonds will be awarded to the responsible bidder whose proposal will result in the lowest net cost to the District. The successful bid will be determined by computing the total amount of interest which the District would be required to pay from the date of each bond to its respective maturity date at the coupon rate or rates specified in the bid assuming no bonds are called prior to maturity, less premium offered, if any. The purchaser must pay accrued interest, computed on a 360-day basis, from the date of the bonds to the date of delivery. The cost of printing the bonds will be borne by the District.

DELIVERY: Delivery of the bonds will be made without cost to the successful bidder at such bank in the City of Portland, Oregon, as the successful bidder shall name. Payment for the bonds must be made in federal funds. Delivery will be made within thirty days.

FORM OF BID: All bids must be for not less than all the bonds hereby offered for sale and for not more than one hundred percent (100%) of the par value thereof and accrued interest to the date of delivery. Each bid together with bidder's check as herein specified must be enclosed in a sealed envelope addressed to the District and designated "Proposal for Bonds".

BID CHECK: All bids must be unconditional and accompanied by a certified or cashier's check on a bank doing business in the State of Oregon for Sixty-Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$69,700) payable to the order of the District to secure the District from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of its bid. In addition, bidders are requested to supply the total interest costs and not effective interest rate, based upon the aggregate interest cost, if its bid is accepted, that the District will pay upon the issue if the bid is accepted. Such information shall be considered as informative only. Check will be forfeited to the District as liquidated damages in case the bidder to whom the bonds are awarded shall withdraw its bid or fail to complete its purchase in accordance with the terms thereof. No interest shall be allowed on the deposit but the check of the successful bidder will be retained as part payment of the bonds or for liquidated damages as described above. Checks of the unsuccessful bidders will be returned by the District promptly after award of bid.

RIGHT OF REJECTION: The District, by its Board, reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

CUSIP: CUSIP numbers will be imprinted upon all bonds of this issue at the purchaser's request and expense. An improperly imprinted number will not constitute basis for the purchaser to refuse to accept delivery.

NO LITIGATION: At the time of payment for the delivery of said bonds, the District will furnish the successful bidder a certificate that there is no litigation pending affecting the validity of the bonds.
