

MHCC religious weeks to address separation

Speakers, panel discussions and display booths are some of the activities planned for Religious Awareness Weeks at Mt. Hood Community College, starting April 3 and continuing through April 14.

The two-week session is designed to provide a broad educational perspective of different religious organizations. The first week will feature display tables from different college and community religious groups. The second week will focus on the theme of separation, with guest speakers and panel discussions slated. It will concentrate on such areas as separation from the family, marriage and life.

Groups offering booths include Agape, Baha'i, Baptist Student Ministries, Catholic Students Newman Club, Episcopal Students Group, Faith Center Revival Temple Fellowship, Fishermen, and Reedwood Friends Society.

The Latter Day Saints, Seventh-day Adventists, and the World Community of Al Islam in the West—Masajid Mohammed will also establish information areas. In addition to the display booths, films and lectures are scheduled. They will be located in the college center and rooms 1001 through 1008.

Highlights of the opening week include a panel

discussion on Thursday entitled "Comparative Views: God and Man" in room 1001 at noon. Moderator will be Bob Kull, communication skills instructor at MHCC. Friday, Rev. Horace Duke, Providence Hospital chaplain, will speak on "The Art of Living: Dying" at noon in room 1001.

For the second week, several symposiums have been scheduled dealing with aspects of separation.

"Separation from Marriage: Divorce" is the title of the first, Tuesday, April 11, at 7 p.m. in the Vista Dining Room. Participants include Dr. Grant Kooney, Multnomah County prison

chaplain; Sam Fort, director of student work for Northwest Baptist Convention; and Father Karl Flach, advocate for Marriage Tribunal, archdiocese of Portland.

Also on Tuesday at noon, Rabbi Berg of Beth Israel Congregation will speak on "Affirming the Space between the Holy and the Profane." The lecture will be in room 1001.

Father Kent Burtner, a campus counselor from the Newman Center in Eugene will talk on "Separation from Yourself: The Occult Experience", noon, Thursday, April 13 in room 1001.

That evening, a panel discussion is scheduled on

"Separation from Life: Life After Death." Members of the group consist of Dr. Nosratollah Rassek, history professor from Lewis and Clark College; Dr. J. R. Roper Sr., Revival Temple Fellowship; Rev. Dick Palmer, chaplain at Gresham hospital; Rev. Truman Herring, pastor of Mt. Hood Baptist Church; and Father Boniface Lautz, theologian at Mt. Angel.

Moderator will be Anna Mae Tichy, MHCC nursing coordinator. It will be in the Town and Gown Room at 7 p.m.

A film on the relics of King Tut's tomb is on the agenda for Friday, April 14. Entitled "King Tut's Tomb," the film is narrated by Orson Wells and runs 60 minutes. It will play in the Art Mall theater at 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. It will also be shown at 1 p.m. in room 1055.

The final seminar of the week is "Separation from the Family: The Single State." Members of the panel include Linda Shadburne, psychology instructor at MHCC; Stu Weger, pastor at Good Sheppard Community Church; and Kay O'Neill, SNJM Formation director for Holy Names Sisters.
