



**Splintered pole**

A CAR went off the road and splintered a power pole last Friday afternoon at the intersection of Ten Eyck Road and Southeast Bobtail Lane near Cedar Creek Bridge. **Festival will feature parade**

Sandy Mountain Days is shaping up for a big week of family fun July 4-9, with addition of a downtown parade a featured event. Sandy Civic Services is already signing entries for the July 6 evening parade. The last summer parade in 1975 attracted some 150 entries. The parade would award best entries in float, marching group and equestrian divisions. Theme for the 7 p.m., July 6, parade will be "Mountain Fantasy." There will be sweepstakes awards for best use of theme, best marching group (Florence award), best equestrian entry (grand marshal award), best commercial float (queen's award), and best non-commercial, civic or communities float (mayor's trophy). Deadline for all entries is June 22. Entries may be sent to Parade Committee, Sandy Civic Services, Box 592, Sandy. Members of the Mt. Hood Mudders 4-wheel club will act as official parade marshals. No political entries will be allowed, except with special approval of the Parade committee. Float size requirements are 16 feet maximum width, 13 feet for maximum height, 60 feet maximum length and ground clearance of the frame at least 10 inches. Entries may be mailed to Sandy Services or brought to

the Sandy Post, City Hall or participating merchants. **OUTLINE OF EVENTS** The week of fun starts July 4 with Little League baseball all day at the high school athletic field. Dale Nichols will emcee a vaudeville evening show, with fireworks rounding out the evening with a display at the high school at 10 p.m. On July 5 there will be an all-breeds pet show at the Community School and snow shoe baseball in the evening. Thursday will feature bike races and a bike decorating contest at the Community School, the evening parade, a carnival and the annual merchants' moonlight sale. The Lions' beergarden is also expected to open that night. **PET ROCKS, CUPS** Friday will see the annual pet rock races with elimination races in the afternoon and special races in the evening. There will also be wrist wrestling contests in Pioneer Square Friday. Sandy area Jaycee's will serve as "Keystone Cops," with the carnival and evening beergarden rounding out the full day. **Suspect leaves calling card**

When a hit and run driver ran into Robert Edward Shibley of Brightwood last Thursday, he left his calling card. Clackamas County Sheriff's Department reports said the rear end of the other vehicle came over the line, struck the left front fender of Shibley's vehicle and kept going. "The suspect's license plate fell off," said a spokesman for the sheriff's department. "It made it kind of convenient." The name of the suspect has not been released, pending further investigation. Also with Shibley was his brother, John, 23, also of Brightwood. The accident took place at about 4:45 p.m. No injuries were reported.
