MHCC hosts conference on prevention of water deaths

A Prevention of Water Deaths Conference is being hosted by Mt. Hood Community College Saturday, April 29, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The conference is designed to educate the public toward preventing the large number of unnecessary water related deaths. Material presented by national and Canadian authorities on the subject will prepare participants to utilize information for personal and community safety.

The conference is being sponsored by the Oregon Medical Association, Oregon State Emergency Services, U.S. Coast Guard, and the college's community services office with the support of grants from Clackamas County Medical Society and Merck Sharp and Dohme Postgraduate Program.

Committee members organizing the conference are Dr. Bo Clingman, instructor of anatomy and physiology at MHCC, and local physicians Dr. Cameron Bangs and Dr. Walt Enders. They have brought together the following eight authorities on the problems of water related deaths:

Dr. William Brady, Oregon State Medical Examiner, has had considerable contact with water death problems. His statistical data provide a partial profile of the causes of drowning accidents.

Dr. Cameron Bangs, Oregon City physician, is a recognized leader and

researcher in mountain rescue techniques and the treatment of hypothermia.

John Bernhartsen, assistant chief of the Educational Branch of the Auxiliary and Education Division, U.S. Coast Guard, will present an overview of water safety programs as seen by the Coast Guard.

Dr. Keith Cooper, researcher on hypothermic problems, will present data relating to physiological responses to acute immersion in cold water. Cooper is director of the Division of Medical Physiology, University of Calgary School of Medicine.

Dr. John Hayward, professor of physiology at the University of Victoria and developer of the Thermoflat jacket, has been associated with a number of research projects studying physiological stress on people immersed in the cold Northwest seas.

Dr. Martin Nemiroff is well known for his research into prevention of water deaths and scuba diving safety. Of particular interest is his work relating to reviving drowning victims submerged in cold water. Nemiroff is currently a professor of medicine and pulmonary disease specialist at the University of Michigan School of Medicine.

Dr. Michael Strauss, orthopedic physician and surgeon at Memorial Hospital Medical Center in

Long Beach, Calif., is a retired naval medical diving officer associated with several diving physiology research projects. He will present information pertaining to the role panic plays in the sequence of drowning.

Ken Warren, explorer and white water boat guide has recently returned from an expedition of the Upper Ganges River. His film relating the exploration of the river will be shown. Warren is associated with Lute Jerstad Adventures, Inc.
