

SUHS graduates given scholarships

More than \$35,000 worth of scholarships were doled out to members of the Sandy Union High School class of 1978 last Thursday during commencement.

Class valedictorian Becky Swanson, who graduated with a 3.99 grade point average on a 4.0 scale, was co-winner of the SUHS Student Body Award and received the distinction of being an Oregon State Scholar.

Salutatorian Rebecca Koepke, who graduated with a 3.96 grade point average, was also an Oregon State Scholar, in addition to receiving the Konrad Noble Memorial Scholarship.

Katie Nuenfeldt was another Oregon State Scholar. She also won a National Honor Society scholarship and was the recipient of the Sandy Kiwanis Club scholarship.

John Knapp was recognized as an Oregon State Scholar. He received an honors at entrance and academic achievement scholarship for Linfield College.

Also receiving the Oregon

Scholar designation was Kathy Brown.

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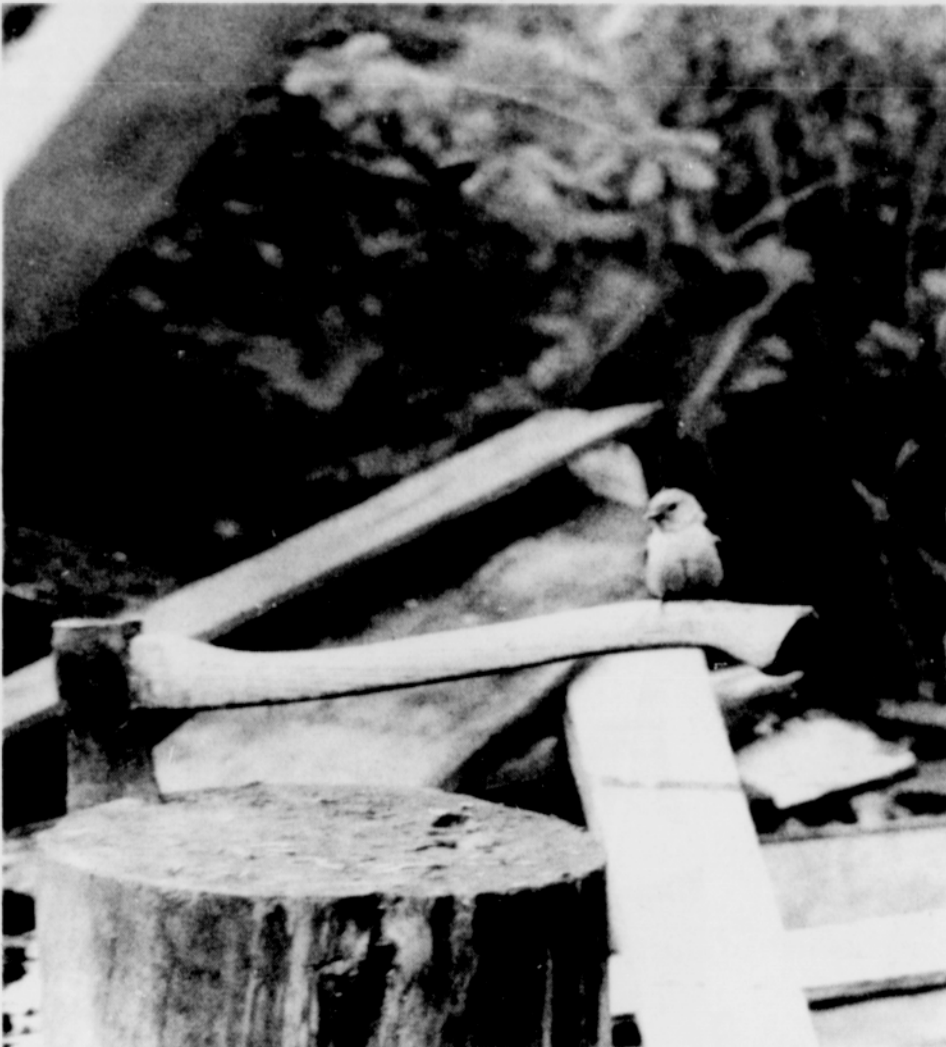

Bookmobile to move tales around county

Clackamas County Library will move its tales to locations throughout the county this summer.

On the second Monday of each month (June 12, July 10 and Aug. 7) the bookmobile is due at Cottrell School from 12:15 to 2 p.m.; Carver School from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. and in Boring at the Western Farms Food Center from 5 to 7 p.m.

On June 6, July 11 and Aug. 1 (the first Tuesday of the month) the bookmobile is scheduled to travel to Ripplebrook from 10-11:30 a.m., the Ripplebrook Ranger

Station from 11:30-12; Timber Lake Job Corp Center from 12:30-1:15 p.m. and Three Lynx School from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

On the first Wednesday of each month (June 7, July 5 and Aug. 2) the bookmobile will be at the Government Camp Post Office from 10-11:30 a.m., Rhododendron Sentry Market from 12-1:30 p.m. and at the Lions Club Hall in Wemme from 2-4 p.m.

The first Thursday of each month (June 8, July 6 and Aug. 3) will find the bookmobile at Firwood School from 9:30 to 11 a.m.;

Brightwood Store from 11:30 to 1:30 and Hoodland Park Plaza in Welches from 2 to 4 p.m.

On the first Saturday of each month (June 3, July 1 and Aug. 5) the bookmobile will be at Zig Zag Inn from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.; Aims Community Church from 12:15 to 1:15 p.m. and Dodge Park from 1:45 to 4 p.m.

The bookmobile service will include records and requests for books. Library cards will be available.

Applications taken for summer camp

The Clackamas County Youth Commission's free summer camp will be taking applications soon.

This year's camp will offer eight three-day sessions to a total of 240 county youngsters age 6-14. Two-thirds of the campers must be from low-income families, said camp director Ellen Rogers.

Activities at the camp include an outdoors school, arts and crafts and square dancing.

Rogers mentioned two unique features of the camp—a rakukin for baking pots and "a cordon bleu chef."

Camp sessions begin July 11 and run through Aug. 30. Camps are held at three sites: Camp Onhaalee near Molalla, Camp Leeward near

Eagle Creek and Homestead Camp in Rhododendron.

Rogers said the camp is "absolutely free." Equipment is on loan from the Clackamas Intermediate Education District and county schools.

The camp is now in its fourth year.

Applications will be available next week through the Youth Commission, 1085 SW Seventh, West Linn; the Clackamas County Health Division at the corner of Kaen and Warner-Milne roads in Oregon City; and from the Clackamas IED on the Maryhurst campus in West Linn.
