Pay freeze affects building trades

Labor and management have agreed to a pay freeze affecting some 3,000 heavy-construction workers in Oregon.

"Someone has to take the first step toward cutting down costs, or at least in moderating increases in labor and construction costs," said A.J. Castelbuono, labor relations manager for the Oregon-Columbia chapter of Associated General Contractors Inc.

The freeze applies only to workers in the unskilled classification. Others will receive a 53-cent wage hike to \$9.83 per hour.

Castelbuono told newsmen about 1,500 heavy-construction firms would be affected by the agreement, which will keep the basic wage for about 75 percent of the 4,000 Laborers' union members at \$8.40 per hour.

The agreement was renegotiated as provided in an existing five-year contract that expires in 1980. The only change in the total package will be an additional 16 cents for fringe benefits.

The current pact provides for cost-of-living adjustments annually, and this would have given the construction workers a 6.3 percent increase this year.

"The new rates are designed to have minimal inflationary impact," the Oregon AGC chapter said in an announcement made jointly with the union's Oregon, Southern Idaho and Wyoming District Council.

Tut lecture scheduled

The mysteries of Egypt and King Tutankhamun will be explored during two lectures at Clackamas Community College June 15 and 20.

Rabbi Joshua Stampfer, of Congregation Neveh Shalom and faculty member of Portland State University's Middle East Studies Center, will lecture on the historical and religious background of King Tut. The lecture will be held at the college's Community Center, room 117, Thursday, June 15, at 7 p.m.

The artistic significance of the treasures found in the King Tut tomb will be discussed by Kirk Lybecker, Portland artist with a background in archeology. The lecture, which will include slides of the Tut exhibit, will be given in the college's McLoughlin Hall, room 119, on Tuesday, June 20, at 7 p.m.

Victim of crime is DA's concern

OREGON CITY — Were you ever robbed and had to appear in court? If so, you may have felt that the thief was treated better than you were.

Clackamas County District Attorney Jim O'Leary wants to see that the victim of a crime is given as much attention as the criminal. That's the principle behind the new Victim Services Unit of O'Leary's office.

The unit is an expansion of the Oregon Victims Compensation Act, which took effect in January. That act made it possible for victims of crimes to be compensated for medical and psychiatric expenses, loss of earnings and rehabilitation expenses from the State Accident Insurance Fund.

While the unit started out in January simply to assist victims in filling out the forms and coping with the law's requirements,

O'Leary's office plans to expand its role.

"We want to acquaint victims with the avenues of approaching problems," said Deputy District Attorney Robert Burns. Burns expects the unit to act eventually as an ombudsman for the victim with the judge by 1) writing a pre-sentence report to the judge on how the victim has suffered and 2) by stressing restitution of property damage or loss to the victim as a requirement of the sentence.

"We need communication and credibility with the bench before anything else," said Burns.

The unit currently consists of three persons: director Roi Hokinson, an assistant director, and a Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) employee. Hokinson expects to make extensive use of volunteers. She also expects to have more CETA help soon.

Health study aid open to students

Minority college students in their junior or senior years are invited to apply by June 9, 1978 for a summer work-study program in Health Administration.

Up to seven students will be selected to receive \$1,250 each for the 10-week course which begins on June 26. The Kaiser-Permanente Medical Care Program, coordinator for Oregon, is accepting applications.

The work-study program is funded through the Association of University Programs in Health Administration, and by public and private donations.

Work experience and study opportunities under the preceptorship of health care administrators, will be provided at Good Samaritan Hospital and Medical Center, Blue Cross of Oregon, the Veterans Hospital and Kaiser-Permanente.

The AUPHA work-study program is primarily designed for minority college students pursuing degrees in business administration and related fields (accounting, economics, finances, etc.). The objective is to increase awareness of and stimulate interest in health care careers and middle management positions, while providing meaningful experiences in the field.

Andrea Belcher, Kaiser-Permanente's supervisor of personnel and equal employment opportunity officer, is responsible, for coordinating the summer program, including screening of applicants.
