Harding off to Europe

Warren Harding of Sandy
 is among a group of 57
 national members of Future
 Farmers of America who
 have left for an extended
 summer tour of 10 European
 countries as part of a work
 study program.

Harding will stay with a
 Swiss farming family for
 most of the summer where
 he will work on the farm
 observing agricultural
 techniques of Europeans.

The FFA work experience
 abroad program is sponsored
 by the National FFA
 organization. Its goals are to
 familiarize future American
 farmers with farming
 customs of other countries
 and to become acquainted
 with people in other parts of
 the world.

Participants live and work
 with host families observing
 and using the agricultural
 techniques of the host
 country as they learn the
 history, culture, traditions
 and ways of life of the people
 there.

Harding participated in a
 three-day orientation
 program at national FFA
 headquarters in Alexandria,
 Virginia before leaving for
 Europe June 10.

The group arrived in St.
 Martin, West Germany
 where they met with their
 European counterparts in
 the FFA for a final briefing
 before moving on to the in-
 dividual host countries.

Harding will be staying
 with the family of Urs Witschi
 Neuhaus in Hindelbank,
 Switzerland.

The American group will
 regroup in September when
 they will embark on an ex-
 tended tour of Europe before
 heading back to the State.

Insulation funds still available to seniors

SALEM — Funds are still
 available for senior citizens
 who haven't used their state
 weatherization refund
 vouchers, according to John
 J. Lobdell, Director of the
 Oregon Department of
 Revenue.

The 1977 legislature ap-
 propriated \$4 million to help
 low income seniors
 weatherize their homes.
 Over \$3.3 million, or 84
 percent, of the appropriation
 remains unspent.

Last fall the revenue
 department mailed over
 65,000 vouchers to senior
 citizens who meet the
 program requirements. The

voucher is worth up to \$3000
 for specific kinds of
 weatherization work.

To claim the refund,
 homeowners must return the
 completed voucher to the
 department with proof of
 weatherization expenses
 (receipts, work orders,
 cancelled checks).

To date, the department
 has issued almost 2,500
 refunds averaging \$186. The
 department will issue
 refunds until January 1, 1980,
 or whenever the appropria-
 tion runs out, if
 earlier.

The weatherization refund
 program is open to persons
 who meet the following

qualifications:

- Were 60 or older on
 January 1, 1977
- Had 1976 household in-
 come of less than \$7,500
- Own a home with a 1976-77
 assessed value of under
 \$30,000
- Received a 1976
 homeowner property tax
 refund
- Are not eligible for any
 federal weatherization aid,
 grant or loan.

Persons who have

 have received a voucher may
 call the Oregon Department
 of Revenue toll free at 1-800-
 452-2838.
