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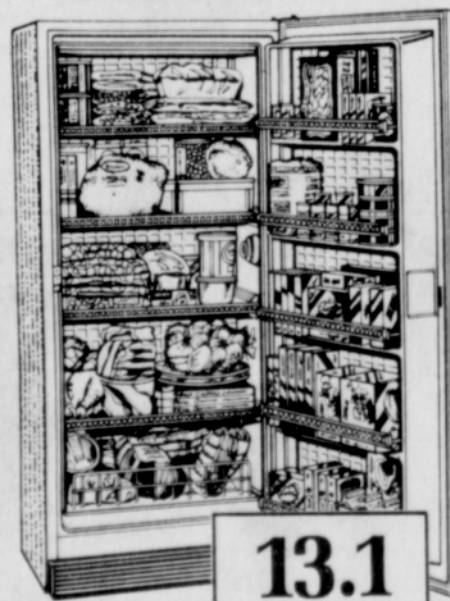
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Blackwell sues City of Sandy

A Portland man who claims his constitutional rights were infringed on when he was arrested for a traffic violation in Sandy last summer has filed a \$40,000 suit against the arresting police officer and the City of Sandy.

An attorney for Richard L. Blackwell has filed the complaint in Clackamas County Circuit Court against the city and police officer Harold Skelton.

Blackwell contends in the suit that he was stopped by Skelton on Sept. 16, 1977, and was asked to hand over his driver's license. Skelton reportedly issued Blackwell a citation for failure to change his address on the license.

Blackwell alleges that he was "frisked and battered" by Skelton and imprisoned in Clackamas County jail without bond.

Blackwell also claims he was forced to abandon his car on a heavily travelled highway.

Skelton left the Sandy police force in February to take a job with the Salem police department. However, he returned to the Sandy police force in April after a two-month period there.

Blackwell is contending that the officer was acting outside the scope of his jurisdiction. He is seeking \$20,000 in general damages and \$10,000 punitive damages on two counts.

Sewer petition extension seen

Petitions to the Clackamas County commissioners to conduct a new sewer study in the Boring area will probably

be circulated through the summer, Lloyd Hinkhouse said.

Hinkhouse, president of Boring Action Neighborhood Group, said the group will discuss when to submit petitions at its Thursday meeting at 7:30 p.m. in the Boring Fire Hall.

"We'd like to hang on to them to get a better idea of what more people want," he said. "I think we'll circulate them at least until July and probably until August."

Hinkhouse said the county and the Department of Environmental Quality has "not been pressuring" Boring residents and business to install the sewer the agencies say is required in the downtown area. Residents have complained they cannot afford a limited sewer under present zoning.

A new county sewer study would give people an idea of the cost of sewers and could show cause for limited growth in Boring, Hinkhouse said. A previous county study, which covered 125 homes on 225 acres, said sewers would not be economically feasible.

"If we could have limited growth with three or four houses per acre, they might be able to afford it," Hinkhouse said.

Baby's early arrival forces home delivery for woman

When Judy Green woke up early last Wednesday morning and felt a little pain, she thought nothing of it. After all, it was all part of being pregnant and her baby wasn't due until July 27.

Unfortunately, babies don't carry calendars with them. When the pains were down to 15 minutes apart, the Estacada woman knew that it was the real thing.

So, at about 6 a.m., Mrs. Green got in the car and drove to the house of her nursing friend Jean Hodge, just outside of Sandy.

"When she got here she was already in the labor stage," said Mrs. Hodge, "that's why I didn't let her go anywhere."

It was obvious that there wasn't enough time to make it to the hospital, so Mrs. Hodge with the help of her daughter Lori, began preparing for a home delivery. Lori fetched the towels and called the Sandy Fire Department while Mrs. Hodge, a veteran of four emergency child births, attended to the expectant mother.

The Sandy fire department received the call and dispatched a rescue unit to the scene, but they were beaten to the scene by Tom Bennett, a volunteer, who picked up the call on his pager.

"I only live about three-fourths of a mile away so I went over there," said Bennett. "When I got there, the baby

was just starting to crown."

Five minutes later, Mrs. Green gave birth to a healthy seven-pound, seven-ounce baby girl.

Bennett, who has an Emergency Medical Technician certificate, was on the phone to the doctor during the delivery relaying message back and forth.

"I thought it was pretty exciting," said Bennett. "It doesn't happen every day, although I figured it would probably happen to me someday."

Mrs. Green doesn't remember much about the birth after arriving at the Hodge residence. She had to drive there herself, because her husband, Bud, was at work.

"I was kind of woozy, I don't remember much," she said. "It was a fairly easy delivery though, easier than the first one." Her first child, five-year-old Sally, was born at a hospital.

The Sandy rescue unit arrived just after the baby was delivered, and went to work with the post-delivery details. They snipped the umbilical cord, stopped Mrs. Green's bleeding and administered an I.V., then they took her to Woodland Park Hospital.

The result of all the efforts is Angela Kay Greene.

As for the mother, she thought the whole affair was a breeze.

Said Mrs. Greene: "If I have another baby, I'm going to have it at home."
