

# Adventists hold 100th camp

GLADSTONE — Oregon Seventh-day Adventists will converge on Gladstone this weekend for the 100th annual camp meeting.

Highlighting the nine-day affair will be a centennial observance July 16, in which the 118 congregations in Western Oregon and south-western Washington will participate.

When the camp meeting gets under way Friday evening, an expected 8,000 people will have already moved into cabins and tents as well as set up their own recreation vehicles on the 79-acre site adjacent to the I-205 freeway.

On Saturday, the attendance will swell to more than 15,000 for a full day's schedule of religious services. Programs designed especially for each age group from infant through adults are aimed at bringing spiritual refreshing as well as evangelistic stimulation.

The Gladstone event is one of the three largest among some 50 such gatherings throughout North America conducted by the Adventist denomination each year.

Services each day get under way with a morning

devotional program in the main pavilion. There are meetings for other groups throughout the day as well as recreational activities for the youth and children. Morning and afternoon classes will feature specialists in such areas as parent-effectiveness training, nutrition and total health, Christian writing, Sabbath school art design, studies from the book of St. Matthew and others.

A constituency meeting has been called for Sunday morning, July 16, in which delegates will determine whether or not the Oregon Conference shall construct a new conference headquarters office.

Each evening in the main pavilion a 10-minute vignette featuring a 10-year segment of Oregon Adventist church history will be presented prior to the featured speaker. In addition, several state government figures are scheduled throughout the week to speak briefly at the evening sessions. Among them will be Governor Robert Straub, former Congresswoman Edith Green and State Senator Mary Roberts.

## Lumber shortage remains acute

PORTLAND — A rail car shortage which began with last winter's heavy storms in the Midwest and East is still pinching Western lumbermen six months later, according to a survey of mills conducted July 1 by the Western Wood Products Association.

The July 4th holiday and some annual mid-summer mill vacation shutdowns are expected to relieve the situation temporarily, according to James G. Manning, WWSA's director of transportation.

However, the industry is looking at a report by the Interstate Commerce Commission that indicates the rail car shortage can now be expected to continue in some areas through the remainder of 1978.

While many mills were reporting improvement as compared to the peak of the shortage in April and May — and some mills served by

more than one railroad indicated almost normal service had been restored — a scarcity of cars persists to some degree just about everywhere, Manning reported.

West of the Cascades in the Pacific Northwest, the shortage seems to focus on flat cars, though all types are affected, the survey revealed.

Manning noted that part of the problem is that some railroads apparently no longer have sufficient locomotive power to move the cars required to provide the service needed.

He also pointed out that some large and mid-sized producers are expanding their own private car fleets to offset the lack of railroad-owned equipment. However, he added, these companies are experiencing slow car return by the rail services which is increasing the cost of private rolling stock.

## College sponsors youth theatre group

An intensive theater program is being held for 16 Clackamas County youths at Clackamas Community College this summer.

Sponsored by the Comprehensive Education and Training Act (CETA), the program is providing summer employment as well as training in all aspects of theater for young people from socially and economically deprived backgrounds.

The main focus of the program, according to coordinator Roby Robinson, is to create a series of children's theater productions that will be given throughout Clackamas County in August.

The members of the group, which calls itself the Third Generation Players, will use their newly acquired skills in Mime, improvisational acting, set design and construction, costume design, play writing and production

to produce the original shows.

"The other focus of the program is to prepare the participants with various life skills and theater knowledge," said Robinson, who is an instructor and theater technician at Clackamas.

"It prepares them for life situations as well as for situations where they can earn college credit for participating in programs like this," he said.

Participants in the group have many different goals but most of them see the program as a chance to learn theater skills as well as social skills.

"I wasn't sure what I wanted to do when I started," said Debbie Ranke, of Oregon City. "I knew I liked Shakespeare, but now my goals are to learn to trust people."

"It's my big chance to start out in theater," said

Theresa Rasmussen, of Oregon City.

Members of the group are being paid minimum wage, \$2.65 per hour, to study and work with the company. They work seven hours a day from Monday through Thursday.

According to Robinson, the program began three years ago when CETA needed summer jobs for disadvantaged young people in the area.

"There weren't enough job openings so they asked me to start this theater program," he said. "The program is part of SPEDY (Summer Program for Economically Disadvantaged Youth), but I've changed that to include socially as well as economically disadvantaged people."

Beginning in August, the group will give daily performances in schools and parks to children's groups throughout the county.

"We'll also hold workshops and things for kids to participate in," said Renee Yoder, group secretary. "The group is learning how to teach games and exercises that will involve kids who come to see us perform."

"We want every person in the group to know a little bit about lighting, construction, designing, mime and children's theater, so that in August they can lead kids in games and get on stage and communicate."

According to Yoder, the group has no trouble getting bookings and their reputation has made them extremely popular.

"We already have 25 bookings for August and we haven't contacted four communities yet," she said.
