## New music store offers wide variety of instruments, lessons and repairs

An Estacada family has packed up its guitars, horns and harmonica to relocate the family business in downtown Sandy. Alpine Music on Proctor features several top lines of guitars plus all band instruments, sheet music, lessons and repairs. Lori and Mike Kirkwood of Estacada operated Timber Music in Estacada for about a year before deciding to relocate here. The couple operates the music store in partnership with Mike's mother, Carol E.

Kirkwood, who also works in the shop. Alpine Music is located in Sandy's new Western Alley Building across from Thriftway on Proctor Boulevard. Guitar lessons soon will be offered, with Collins Farr of Alder Creek as instructor. Farr is a musician-songwriter who hopes to record his own album soon. The shop also features the hand-made harpsichords of Gary Hango of the Sandy area. The Kirkwoods got into the

music store business as an outgrowth of Mike Kirkwood's private collection of instruments and home repair service of violins. He played the trumpet in school and later picked up the guitar. As a hobby he collected so many instruments in his home that friends encouraged him to open his own music store. Kirkwood still works for Reynolds Aluminum and rotates shop duty with his wife and mother. Wife Lori Kirkwood plays the piano, organ and guitar.

Alpine Music specializes in guitars and carries everything in straps, pics and strings. The shop also carries sheet music, harmonicas, drums and band instruments including trumpets, trombones, saxophones, clarinets and flutes. Repairs are offered on nearly all instruments. In addition to guitar lessons, the shop plans soon to offer lessons on trumpet and bass guitar. The store offers guitar rentals to students.

## Films set for study center

The following films are coming attractions at the Northwest Film Study Center at the Portland Art Museum. "Under Milk Wood" (England, 1971) stars Peter O'Toole and Richard Burton in a film version of Dylan Thomas' play about daily life in a small Welsh village. It will be shown Thursday, July 20, at 8 p.m. The award winning film, "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman" (1974) starring Cicely Tyson is the story of a black woman who lived through slavery and survived to the age of 110. The film was originally made for television. It won nine

Emmy awards when it first appeared. The film will be shown Saturday, July 22, at 2 p.m. Part one of "They Forty-Seven Ronin" (Japan, 1942) will be shown Saturday, July 22, at 8 p.m. The film is one of the best known stories in Japanese legend. It depicts the story of the 47 Ronin, samurai warriors who pretended debauchery for years waiting for a chance to avenge the murder of their leader. The second part will be shown Sunday, July 23. Each film is a self-contained unit according to officials at the Film Study Center.

## Fair to include two horse shows

Two separate horse shows and an all-Indian rodeo will be part of the 1978 Greater Multnomah County Fair at the Expo Center July 28-August 6.

The big Expo Center arena will be devoted to the "horsy" set the first five days of the fair and to the first Portland All Indian rodeo the last three days, Aug. 4, 5 and 6. New along with the rodeo is an open one-day horse show with Oregon Horsemen's

Association approval for entries of all ages. The open event will be Sunday, July 30. For two days on either side of it, the Multnomah county 4-H horseclubs will present their county fair show, involving some 250 young people and their mounts. The rodeo, jointly sponsored by the Portland Intertribal Council and the Willamette Valley Rodeo Association, is expected to attract Indian rodeo top hands from all over the western U.S. and Canada.

## Rangers to hold Show-me program

An informal "show-me" program will be presented by the Forest Service on the Clackamas Planning Unit at Estacada High School at 7:30 p.m., July 19 and Santiam High School at 7:30 p.m., July 26, according to Joel Dahlin, Estacada District ranger, Mt. Hood National Forest. The purpose of the show me program is to review the inventory and suitability analyses for a number of resources including timber and geothermal.

"This is another phase of the land management process on the 350,000 acre Clackamas Planning Unit begun in 1976," said Dahlin. "We're looking for feedback from the public on the approach taken thus far," he added. The Clackamas Planning Unit lies within the southern portion of the Mt. Hood National Forest and the northern portion of the Willamette National Forest. Within its boundaries are the Bull of the Woods and Olallie Roadless (RARE II) areas.

## What's cooking Muffins and Ma's casserole

### BREAKFAST MUFFINS

- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 cup oatmeal
- 1 egg, unbeaten
- 1/2 cup dark brown sugar
- 1/4 cup oil or melted shortening
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon soda

Pour buttermilk over oatmeal and let stand. Combine egg and sugar and mix well, then add oil. Sift together all remaining dry ingredients. Add buttermilk mixture and egg mixture to dry ingredients. Mix well. Pour into greased muffin tins or use baking cups. Bake at 400 degrees for 18-20 minutes. Makes 1 dozen delicious muffins.

If you like a hot fruited muffin, you might add 1/2 cup chopped dates.

### MOM'S CASSEROLE

- 2 lbs. hamburger (or 1 lb. hamburger and 1 lb. ground pork)
- 1 medium onion
- 2 stalks celery, chopped
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 1 1/2 cups stuffed olives, drained
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup (Dilute soups a little with milk)
- 1 to 1 and a third cups uncooked minute rice cooked according to pkg. directions
- 1 large can Chinese noodles
- 1 (7 oz.) jar of cashew nuts

Brown meat until it loses its redness. Remove from heavy skillet. Then saute vegetables. Return meat to pan, add soups diluted with a little milk, and the cooked rice. Simmer in heavy pan or crock pot for 2 hours. Stir the cashew nuts in just before serving. Place in a large serving casserole and top with Chinese noodles which have been warmed in the oven. The flavor even improves the second day.

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## Permits available

Individual free use firewood permits good for one weekend cutting day will be issued at Zig Zag Ranger Station beginning Monday, July 17. Cutting will begin on July 22 and 23, and continue through the summer weekends. Permits are good for up to five cords.

The number of permits issued for each day will be limited due to cutting locations. Cutting will be limited to low fire hazard days only.

Log decks created by past logging operations need to be reduced to aid reforestation and eliminate fire hazard, according to a Forest Service spokesman. Rather than burn these decks, the Forest Service is offering this wood to the public.

Due to the current fire season, chainsaws must be inspected at the Ranger Station prior to the issuing of the cutting permit. State and federal fire laws will be strictly enforced. These laws include a requirement for each cutter to have an axe, shovel and a fire extinguisher or bucket of water within 50 feet of the cutting area.

Copies of state and federal fire laws pertaining to firewood cutting and use of chainsaws on the national forest will be issued to cutters at time of saw inspection.
