

4-H members beat inflation by sewing their clothing

Clothing is a statement about yourself and your times. It also represents a considerable investment.

Sandy area 4-H members enrolled in clothing projects are beating the high cost by doing it themselves while learning how to get the best value for their money in fabrics and notions.

"The 4-H'ers are as fashion conscious as any other group of young people," Mrs. Stulken points out. "The difference is that they have learned how to express themselves by sewing garments that are just right for them."

Visitors at the 1978 Clackamas County Fair, August 15-20, will get a chance to see for themselves just how skillful 4-H'ers have become at creating their own fashion scene in 4-H clothing, knitting or crocheting projects, adds Mrs. Stulken.

Mariette Davis, Milwaukie, 4-H Style Revue chairwoman, reminds all 4-H Style Revue participants that the Style Revue judging will take place on Wednesday, August 9, at the Clackamas County Fairgrounds in Canby.

Garments ranging from ski sweaters to school dresses to baby clothes will be on display in the 4-H

Exhibit Hall during the Fair which opens Tuesday, Aug. 15.

Clothing knitting and crocheting exhibits are judged on their workmanship and the appropriateness of the fabric to the pattern.

"Whether or not the 4-H member continues to sew, knit or crochet, we know they will be better consumers as adults because they are learning what is and what is not good workmanship and what is the best buy for the money," Mrs. Stulken points out.

Custom farming topic of booklet

How can a small farmer grow a crop successfully if he can't afford all the equipment needed?

Often the solution to this problem is custom farming. The farmer can either buy the services of a custom operator to do his spraying, tilling or other operations, or he can buy the equipment and help pay for it through custom farming for his neighbors.

A new bulletin from the Oregon State Extension Service, "Custom Rates for Farming Operations: Yours & Theirs" can help sort out the economics of custom farming. It gives guidelines for establishing custom rates, and shows how to analyze whether machinery should be owned or custom hired.

Revue participants are judged not only on their workmanship, but also on how well they have accessorized their costume, the fit of the garment on the member and the appropriateness of the garment for its intended use.
