The regular scheduled school board meeting for Sandy Elementary School District No. 46 has been rescheduled for Aug. 15 at 8 p.m. The meeting will be held in the library of the upper grades building.

August 18 hearing slated on Bull Run generators

The Water Policy Review Board will conduct a public hearing Aug. 18 on the City of Portland's application to install hydroelectric generators at Bull Run Dams 1 and 2. The hearing will be at 9 a.m. in the Water Service Building Auditorium in Portland.

The generators at dams land 2 would produce 24,000 and 12,000 kilowatts

respectively. The energy would be transmitted to the nearest PGE substation network to be used for street and public lighting in the city of Portland.

The board will also hold a work session on Aug. 17 to discuss the findings of a water resources department study on the Columbia River. The session is part of an ongoing study of the needs

and uses of Columbia River water.

The present study area is a stretch of the river between Hood River and Milton-Freewater covering 6,500 square miles. Included in the study are present and projected water needs for agriculture, domestic and industrial use, maintenance of aquatic life, hydroelectric power generation and navigation.

Decision postponed

Three Sandy River area property owners who requested development permits to build protective devices against erosion have had to wait until at least today for a decision.

Jim Kitchen, Dwight Baum and Richard Surface, as well as a number of other property owners, are concerned that their homes may be in jeopardy if the river is allowed to run its course unchecked.

Backed by two county groups, the owners proposed protective devices for their property in the form of riprap and jetties at a July 27 hearing before the Clackamas County Hearings Officer. The officer postponed a decision, however, continuing the hearing until Aug. 3 in order to receive more testimony. The hearing will be at 7 p.m. in courtroom 4 of the Clackamas County Courthouse.

A similar hearing will be held Aug. 17 to discuss proposed ripraping sites on the Zigzag River. Two sites were specified in a development permit application for the Zigzag area off Dezeny Road and three sites were named just outside Rhododendron. The application was filed by the Clackamas County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Rhododendron Neighborhood group for the Soil Conservation Service.

The Zigzag and Rhododendron property owners, like those in Sandy, hope that the hearings officer will approve their request for protective devices under the Emergency Watershed Protection Act. Should the request be approved, the groups would be eligible for federal funding.

The three sites in Rhododendron would all employ ripraping to protect the river bank. One of the Zigzag sites would use ripraping while the other would have a series of jetties extending into the river. The jetties would only extend into the river during high water periods, however, said county planner Gary Naylor.

The Aug. 3 hearing will be at 7 p.m. in Courtroom 4 of the County Courthouse.

Climbers injured

Three Vancouver, Wash., residents were injured Saturday in a rockslide on Mt. Hood.

Jay Kirk Langsdorf, Patricia Anne Langsdorf and Mitchell George Bauer were descending the mountain when a slide caught them at the 10,500-foot level.

Falling rocks crushed Bauer's foot, broke Jay Langsdorf's leg and bruised Patricia Langsdorf's leg, Clackamas County sheriff's deputies said.

A snowcat from Timberline Lodge transported the climbers back to their car.
