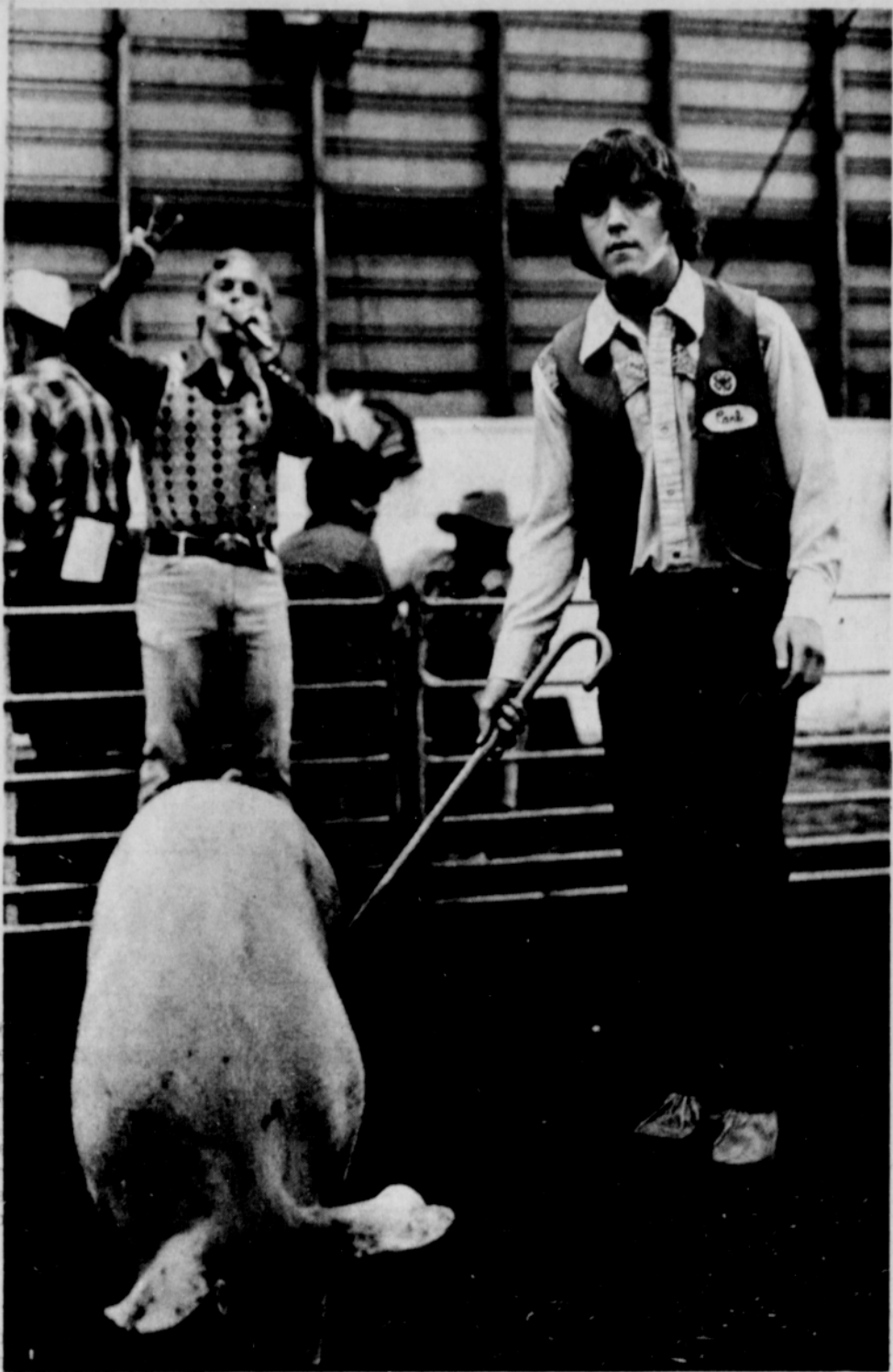

Sandy 4-H and FFA members win scores of awards at county fair

A number of Sandy youngsters were multiple winners at the Clackamas County Fair in Canby which ended Sunday. The Saturday afternoon junior livestock auction allowed many kids to market the animals they have raised for 4-H and FFA projects.

Carrie Brewster was named champion in food preservation and reserve champion in the intermediate division of the Enjoy Your Home competition.

She also won a blue award in the Foods category, a blue in sewing, a second and third place award in the FFA swine category and a second in domestic sciences.

Janna Shockey also placed several times in the fair competitions. She was named champion in four categories: the senior division Enjoy you Home competition, the Recycled Items category, Phase I Crocheting and Creative Arts.

Shockey also qualified for the state fair in the "presentation" category and took second place in the 4-H style show.

John Knapp was named senior champion and reserve grand champion senior showman. Knapp also received the Western States Angus exhibition award.

Knapp's steer was named reserve champion market steer and reserve champion Angus.

Lisa Stankewitsch was named senior champion in goat showmanship. Stankewitsch also won a blue

ribbon in sewing which qualifies her to compete at the state fair level.

Pattie TenEyck won both the champion and reserve champion awards for Simmental animals. She also won a blue in recycled items and a blue in intermediate beef showmanship.

Chris Burks was named fair champion in 4-H photography and will compete at the state fair in that category. She won a blue ribbon in the Enjoy Your Home category and a red in creative arts.

Robin Rohde took first place in the 4-H style show; Sharon Jensen was awarded the reserve champion prize for her feeder steer and a blue ribbon for junior beef showmanship; Sarah Krick won a reserve championship in the dairy crossbred category and a red ribbon in junior beef showmanship.

Gregory Scott was named reserve champion in junior beef showmanship.

The other winners included: Marcy Orr (blue award for beef and red for senior beef showmanship); Karen Vaeretti (red for senior beef showmanship); and Ginny Lemen (red for intermediate beef showmanship).

Other prizes were awarded to: Sonja Sparks (red for junior novice beef showmanship); Mark Vaeretti (white, junior beef showmanship); Alan Gregory (blue, junior beef showmanship); and Tana Nonamaker (blue, junior beef showmanship).

Peas make good fall crop

An Oregon State University extension agent recommends planting peas in home gardens for a fall crop. According to home horticulture agent Ray peas are an excellent fall crop because they build the productivity of the soil even if they do not produce a good yield.

The pea is a legume which adds nitrogen to the soil. McNeilan explained that this enriches the garden for next year's crop. He recommended selecting a pea variety that is mildew-resistant since mildew is a greater problem as the fall rains begin.

Information on lunch menus, student accident insurance information and bus schedules will be sent to students by mail. Bus routes and times will be scheduled the same as last year for intermediate and upper grades (grades 4-8) arriving at the school for the start of 8:30 a.m. classes. Primary grade children (grades 1-3) will start classes at 9 a.m. again.

School bus drivers this year will be Kathy Pearsall and Mary Mattison.

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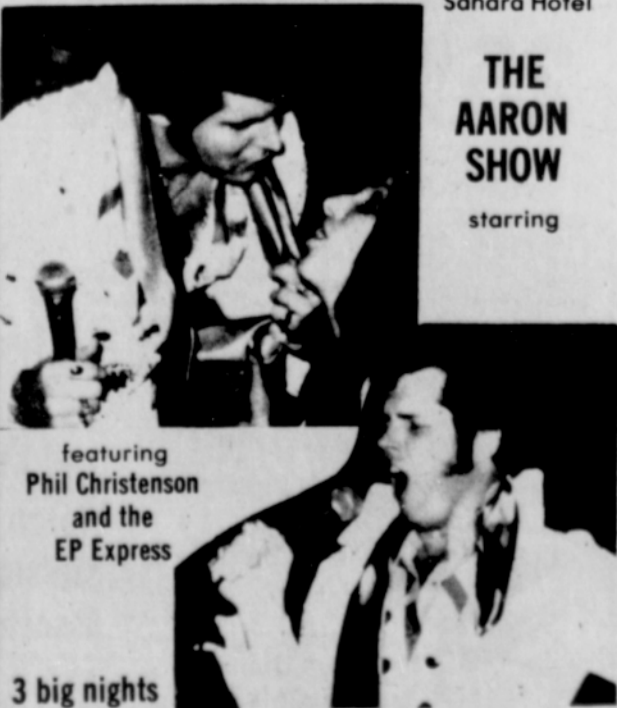
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
