Furniture store opens in town

A new furniture store
featuring all-wood furniture
opens September 1 in the
Gordon Stone Building on
Proctor Boulevard in Sandy.

Wooden Hutch Furniture is
the only furniture store in
town with closure two years
ago of an unfinished furni-
ture outlet here.

In addition to unfinished
furniture, the new store will
carry wood stoves and top-
line finished furniture from
LA Period, Bristol House,
Broyhill and Mount Adams.
The new store contains 2,520
square feet, large enough to
allow periodic changes in
floor display.

The new store is the
culmination of a dream for
two former co-workers,
Keven Jensen, 27, of
Estacada, and Tim Barker,
26, of Boring. The two men
met while employed at
Landa Rents and Sales, for
whom Barker most recently
worked as Sandy store
manager.

Jensen served until
recently as chief accountant
for American Guarantee Life
Insurance. He is a graduate
of Portland State University,
with a graduate degree from
American Graduate School
of International Manage-
ment.

Jensen is a Gresham High

School graduate, while
Barker attended Clackamas
High School and Clackamas
Community College.

The partners completed
their own market research
on furniture needs and op-
portunities in the area before
opening their store.

They will feature un-
finished furniture manu-
factured in the North-
west, tole boards for tole
painting, indoor plants and
wood furniture that is all
wood in construction.

"Our furniture is selected
to fit the needs of the young,

middle-class families
moving into Sandy," Jensen
said.

In addition to furniture, the
store will offer wood stoves
from Fishcher and Ear-
thstove.

The store's grand opening
is set for Friday, September
1.

Women's programs upped

Through the community
education office, Mt. Hood
Community College will be
organizing programs and
activities to provide in-
creased support services for
women.

Beginning fall term, the
services will include: staff
workshops on vocational
guidance to encourage
women into non-traditional
career programs;
facilitating community
workshops on subjects of
interest to women;
developing a community
advisory committee to offer
recommendations on how
women might better be
served by the college. Work-
shops will also deal with
assisting with weekly
sessions for returning

women students who are just
beginning or who are
returning to college after
having their education in-
terrupted; and continuing to
offer women's studies
courses as part of the
academic humanities
requirement.

To defray the costs of these
services, the college
received federal funding for
vocational education
development mandated by

the Vocational Education Act
of 1976.

The funding comes par-
tially as a result of a ten-year
study on career choices for
women conducted by the
Center for Human Resource
Research at Oregon State
University in cooperation
with the Department of
Labor.

DEQ seeks nominees for pollution award

The state Department of
Environmental Quality
(DEQ) is soliciting
nominations of industries,
individuals or civic
organizations who might
qualify for the Oregon CUP
(Cleaning Up Pollution)
Award.

Began in 1972, the Oregon
CUP Award has been pre-
sented by the Environmental
Quality Commission to only
10 industrial firms, eight
individuals, and two
organizations.

According to Dave
Gemma, DEQ represen-
tative, the award is given
annually to those nominees

"Who have shown excellence
in protecting Oregon's en-
vironment, and who have
given extra effort beyond
what is required by state
environmental clean-up
programs."

Nominations by the public
are screened by a nine-
member citizen committee.
Those nominees selected by
the citizens committee are
then presented to the
Environmental Quality
Commission for final
selection.

Winning the award gives
industry and commercial
firms the right to display the
Oregon CUP Award symbol

on product packaging for
products made at the award-
winning plant site. "The
symbol is known to many
Oregonians as represen-
tative of environmental
excellence, often giving
these products a competitive
edge on the market,"
Gemma said.

Nominations of industry,
individuals or organizations
can be made by any in-
terested person. Send the
description of their en-
vironmental protection
accomplishments, and the
specific plant location (for
industry) to: Oregon CUP
Award Program, P.O. BOX
1760, Portland, Oregon 97207.

test will be conducted from
