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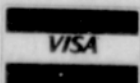

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Vies for 2nd District seat

Political newcomer opposes Ullman

Republican Terry L. Hicks, a welder by trade, is seeking to unseat incumbent Democrat Al Ullman in the race for the 2nd Congressional District.

Hicks has no prior government experience. He is a graduate of San Diego High School and Idaho State University.

The challenger proposes a 30 percent across the board cut in federal income taxes

with a permanent indexing of rates and a rollback of the capital Gains Tax to pre-1969 levels. He also would call for a permanent tax credit for the purchase of a home.

Hicks would also ask for a 10 percent across the board reduction in federal spending starting with Congressional salaries and a 40 percent cut in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Another proposal calls for

an amendment to the U.S. Constitution limiting federal spending to 20 percent of the gross national product with a provision that spending beyond that point be subject to a national referendum.

Ullman has held the seat since 1957. He is chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and co-chairman on the Joint Committee of Taxation.

Ullman's background before his election to

Congress was as teacher, realtor and developer. He graduated from Whitman College (B.A.) and Columbia University (M.A.).

Ullman claims his work on the Ways and Means Committee, one of the most powerful in Congress, identifies him with the federal governments, fight against inflation.

"Runaway inflation is devastating to plans we've made for meeting day-to-day

needs as well as achieving long-range objectives," he said.

"Federal programs are being examined more

carefully than ever to see where savings can be achieved."

Ullman also said he is "dedicated to maintaining the integrity of the Social Security" and says he will continue to work for local concerns of district patrons."

Thoroughbred sale slated

Portland Meadows will supply its facilities for the first known thoroughbred sale to be held in Oregon.

Auctioneer Bill Tackett will open the public bidding at 7 p.m. Monday, Oct. 30, in the mainline area of the Portland Meadows grandstand.

Seventy head of weanlings, yearlings, broodmares and horses of racing age have been consigned to the sale sponsored by the Oregon Thoroughbred Breeders Association. Breeding operations from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California will be represented.

The youngest horses for

sale are the weanlings — foals separated from their mother in the fall of their first year.

Buyers seeking a potential winner in 1979 have the opportunity to bid on 24 well-bred yearlings. A yearling becomes a two-year-old and eligible to race Jan. 1. Bold Lemon, a filly by young sire Kimstar, an unnamed colt by Prince Khal-Ran, a son and daughter of Sir Winzlot and Midnight Lark, a gelded son of Flying Lark are some of the young racing prospects.

There will be "instant race horses" for sale, too. These are three- and four-year-olds currently racing or being exercised into that condition.

Breeders upgrading and expanding broodmare bands will find a strong group of proven producers. The first entry in the buyers catalogue is Fuzzy Fir, Oregon's ninth-ranked producing mare. She is currently in foal to El Dude Grande, by Neke, the stakes-winning son of Bold Ruler. Canadian Stakes winner Wester Thong and Deep Fire, full sister to Washington three-year-old champion Deep Heat, are both expected to cause intense bidding.

The horses will be stalled in Barns One and Two and will be available for public inspection from Friday, Oct. 27, until sale time Monday evening.
