

Health Division surveys children

The Oregon State Health Division will survey Oregon schoolchildren grades two through 12 in January to determine how many children are adequately protected against vaccine-preventable diseases.

The survey, and subsequent follow-up program is called the LIGHT program. (Love Equals Immunization for Good Health Tomorrow). More than 400,000 Oregon children will take home computer survey forms Jan. 9. All forms are to be completed at home and brought back to school the following day.

State health administrator Christine Gebbie said the reason for the early announcement of the LIGHT program is to encourage parents to obtain their children's immunization records in advance so the survey can be easily completed by the required date.

The completed forms will be sent to the state Highway Division computer in Salem where they will be put through an optical scanner. By using the computer, the health division can process the information to get printed results which show the immunization standing of

student populations within individual schools.

The survey is designed to determine how many children are not adequately immunized against polio, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. The results will be turned over to county health departments for use in offering immunization programs to suit the needs of the children before the end of the current school year.

On HUD grant

Input sought

Staff members of the city of Sandy will hold an open meeting Thursday, Nov. 28, to solicit input from city residents on the spending of HUD community development block grant funds anticipated for next year.

Administrative Assistant Susan Greer said the city will make applications to the Clackamas County Department of Human Resources by Jan. 15 for its share of \$2.3 million in grant funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Last year, the county received \$2.1 million in HUD grant funds. Over half that amount went to construction of senior centers in Milwaukie and Oregon City. Sandy received \$9,500 last year for paving of the parking lot at the new community center. It also received \$7,900 for planning services in the area of community development for the next three years.

Areas in which the city will be eligible for the funds are housing rehabilitation, public services and facilities, parks and recreation, historic preservation, and street improvements.

The city has contracted with a Portland firm, CH2M Hill, to write the grant applications after it is determined what projects should receive top priority.

The final decision on which areas will receive the funds will be made by the county commissioners next April. A citizens advisory committee has been selected to forward recommendations to the commissioners on projects they consider worthwhile.

The county is broken down into 10 districts for the purpose of distributing funds. Sandy and the Mt. Hood corridor are in District 10. Sandy Senior Center Director Dick Halvorson is the district representative on the advisory committee.

The majority of the funds for next year are again expected to go to the larger cities "because that's where most of the people are," said Dale Query of the county's Human Resources.

Query said the county will focus in on revitalizing low and moderate income neighborhoods. The overwhelming majority of those areas are in the larger cities which have full-time planning staffs, he added.

The county's department of Housing and Community Development which is handling applications for the funds will hold a county-wide public hearing the night after the Sandy meeting, Wednesday, Nov. 29, at 7:30 p.m., Clackamas Community College, Room 204 of Barlow Hall.

Group says to cut logging

An advisory committee to the Portland City Council recommended last week to limit logging in the Bull Run watershed.

The committee told the council that more evidence is

needed on whether logging has an adverse effect on water quality.

Included in its report is a recommendation that no old growth timber be cut as a preventive measure against

major forest fires.

The report, completed after eight months of study, is in opposition to Forest Service practice of cutting large, old trees which may be targets for bolts of lightning.

The watershed provides water to the Portland area, but is on Forest Service land. The city and the Forest Service are required by federal law to work together on a management plan for the area.

Although the effects of logging on water quality have not been determined, the committee has decided that construction of two hydroelectric generators at Bull Run dams I and II would not pose a threat.
