

Kelso School contract inked

The contract has been inked by the Sandy Elementary School Board and Todd Construction Co. of Portland for the new Kelso School.

Construction got under way earlier this month for the school which will house 12 classrooms and 300 students.

The final price tag is \$2,333,319. The figure represents a reduction of approximately \$190,000 from the original bid submitted by Todd Sept. 25.

Two other building contractors submitted higher bids for the project.

The board negotiated with

Todd to reduce the original bid. Several costly expenditures were eliminated including the reduction from a double paved to single drive in front of the school, elimination of much of the school's proposed cabinetry and modification of the siding from cedar to fir.

The company plans to have the school ready in time for the opening of the 1979-80 school year.

In action taken by the board last week, superintendent Clark Lund was instructed to enter into discussion with a Portland insurance brokerage agency,

Fred S. James Co., to place the district's insurance.

The board made the decision after a lengthy discussion on the other proposals submitted. One was a combination proposal from Sandy insurance agent Bruce Cook and George Morgan of Walrad Insurance Agency in Gresham.

The board opted for the James proposal because it offered "a broader availability of insurance markets," Lund said.

Insurance costs for the district have skyrocketed in recent years, Lund added. Liability coverage for the

district was \$3,900 in 1974-75. The same insurance is billed at \$18,000 for the current school year.

Employee insurance (including dental) for the district is \$84,000. Property damage insurance is \$17,000.

The board also accepted the resignation of school nurse Joyce Kramer.

Mrs. Kramer will continue to serve as nurse for Sandy High and four area elementary districts. Her heavy schedule was given as the reason for resigning, Lund said.

Maxine Lange has been hired on a part-time basis to serve as nurse at the elementary school.
