

# Drunk driver faces 5 years in pen

Sanford E. Copeland of Park Place pleaded guilty last Tuesday to charges of Assault in the Third Degree and Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants.

Copeland will be sentenced following a presentence investigation by Charles Sams, the presiding judge in the case.

By pleading guilty, Copeland faces a maximum sentence of five years in the state penitentiary and a fine of \$2500 on the assault charge and one year in the county jail and a fine of \$1,000 on the intoxicants charge.

The charges against Copeland came as a result of an accident which occurred April 5, when the vehicle he

was driving rear-ended a car driven by Thomas Craig of Portland which was stopped at the intersection of Highway 224 and Webster Road.

Copeland's car struck the Craig vehicle at an estimated 40 miles-per-hour, sending it completely through the intersection, according to reports from Deputy District Attorney Steven L. Maurer.

Craig received a broken neck in the collision and other passengers were treated for minor injuries.

A blood alcohol test done on Copeland 90 minutes after the accident revealed an alcohol content of .20 percent. In Oregon, .10 percent constitutes driving under the influence.

# New press leased by Sandy High

The Sandy High School Board has decided to build up the school's production department, at least temporarily, with the lease of an \$26,000 printing press and collator.

The board voted 3-1 Monday night to lease the 11 by six foot Multilith offset press for \$4,300 for a six-month trial period. The board will be able to continue the lease arrangement for \$8,600 a year for another 2½ years. After that time, the school would own the equipment.

A decision on extending the lease will be made by the board in March in time for next year's budget.

Superintendent Jack Peters told the board the new press would be "cost effective," and would pay for itself in the long run.

The press will replace a small offset model in the school's production department located in the shop area.

The new machine makes its own plates for reproduction, cleans itself and can collate up to 104 pages, according to business manager Jim Smith.

Board member Paul Tucker asked how the school had gotten along in the past without the new press.

Smith responded that much of the printing work is done on a mimeograph machine in the principal's office because of the excessive print load on the press. He said the quality of the mimeograph machine work is sometimes not good.

The school's production department prints an average of 31,000 pieces of material a week, according to Smith. In the recent nine-week quarter there were pieces 280,000 printed.

Peters said he expects the

new press to be delivered by the first of January in time to run the student curriculum forecaster for 1979-80. The forecaster will be a total of approximately 280,000 printed sheets.

Pete Griffin, Welches, voted against the expenditure.

Ginny Brewster, Sandy, said she would vote to approve the lease only if it would improve the space problem of the graphic arts department.

Peters said the new machine and the production department will be put in a classroom next to the present location of the department. That move will open up the graphics area in the production shop.

Classes in the production room classroom would be moved to other empty classrooms, Peters said.

# Weekend religious play slated

The play was originally scheduled to be held in mid-December at Sandy Intermediate grade school but has been moved to the new location because of production problems, according to newly elected One Way Theatre coordinator Judy Sheppard.

"We think we've found a good place for the show," Sheppard said. "Getting it all put together before the holidays was a problem so we decided to postpone it a month."

"The cast and crew are excited about putting the show on in the Oddfellows

Hall. It's a perfect location for a community theatre group and we think we've got a good show."

The play will be performed three times on weekend of Jan. 19, 20, and 21. Curtain time is 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday nights and 2 p.m. for the Sunday matinee.

The play is a comedy written in the early '60's about the problems between a teenage girl and her parents.

Harry McClane, director of the group's spring production, "Happy Birthday, Wanda June," and Shirley Lawson play the parents. Vicky Mills plays the teenage daughter and Dawn Davidson plays her sister.

The group will produce

Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie" in March. Dates for the production will be announced later.

# Teachers dispute pay increase by board

The percent of increase in pay for teachers at Sandy High School is being questioned by the teacher's union there.

The Sandy Education Association has filed a grievance against the school board with the state Employee Relations Board seeking an interpretation on the matter.

The grievance is based on a technical interpretation of the teacher's two-year contract now in its second year.

In question is the amount of increase for the teachers based on the Portland consumer price index. The contract states that the teachers are entitled to a "percentage increase in the base salary" equal to the consumer price index in Portland between July 1977 and July 1978.

That increase was determined to be 9.8 percent and was applied to last year's Step 1 base salary of \$10,000 for a starting rate this year of \$10,980. All other steps in the 14-step salary schedule were also increased \$980.

Teachers with at least one year experience also moved up one step and received an increase of \$360 for their additional year in the classroom.

The association interprets

the contract to read that the cost of living increase should be applied to the step increase as well as the base pay.

Matters of dispute over interpretation of the contract go to the ERB. An arbitrator will decide the outcome and both the association and the local board are required to adhere to that decision.
