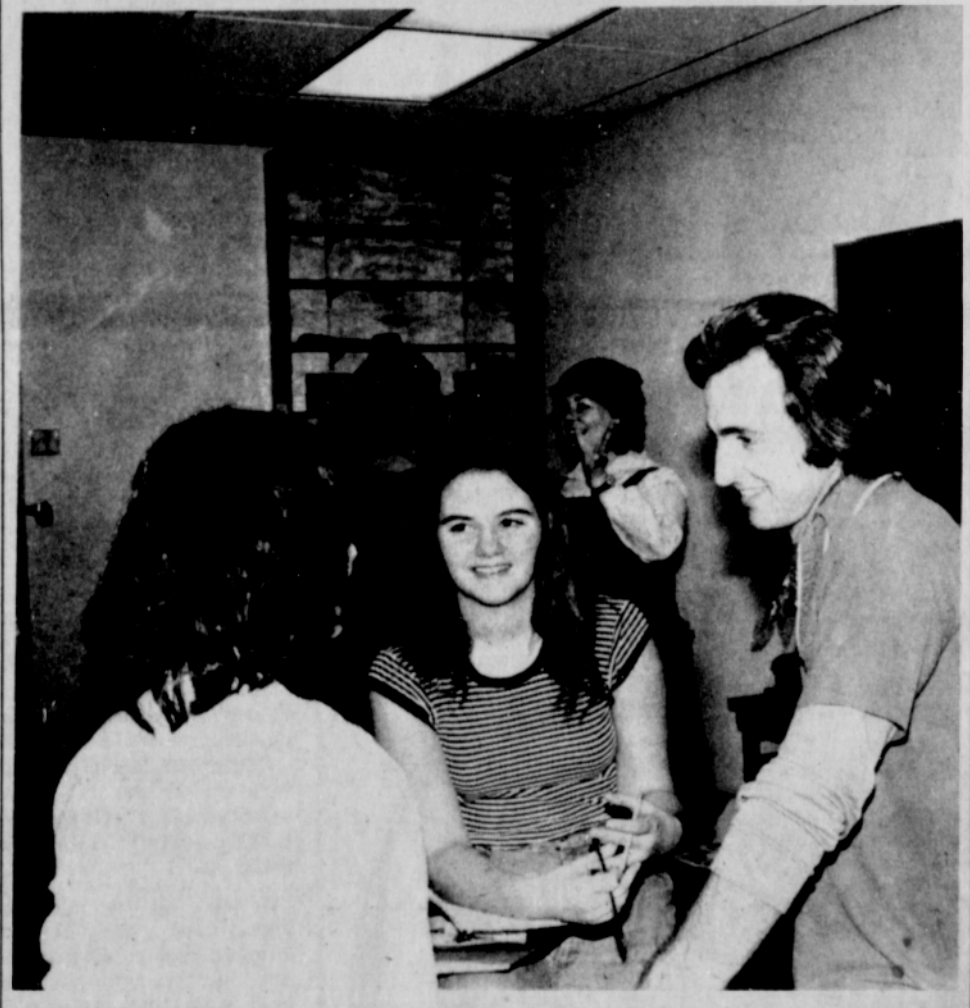




Visiting actors

Board hires architects for future building projects

The Sandy High School Board decided Monday night to hire Richard L. Gessford and Associates of Portland as architects for any expansion projects the school may need in the near future.

Approximately \$82,000 is left from a bond package approved by voters several years ago. The money was to be spent on an administration building but the plan was scrapped.

The architects will be used on a consulting basis for small projects funded by that

balance. Among the projects under consideration are construction of a science lab and replacement or repair of the school's roof.

Superintendent Jack Peters said he had no reservations about transferring the money from an administration building to other areas. "We don't have the most spacious quarters but they're adequate for our operations," he said.

One other area under consideration is the possible need to add on additional

classrooms in light of the growth under way in the district.

Peters told the board he gets impact statement forms from the county on developments in the area which will have an effect on the school. He stated that the district could face a large influx of students based on development plans he has learned of.

The school will not take in out-of-district Redland freshmen next year because of space problems.

Full slate set Saturday for Kids' Day festival

Community Christmas activities in Sandy, Saturday, Dec. 16, include everything from a free drawing to a free children's day in Oddfellows Hall with Santa, Cinnamon Bear, games, prizes and a play.

He last appeared in Oregon in a recital in Pittcock Mansion in Portland. He is now chairman of the music department at Brescia College in Owensboro, Ky.

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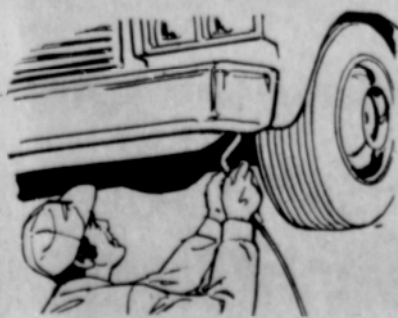
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
