Tri-Met takes ads on board.

Tri-Met has space to sell to almost everybody but politicians on the outside and inside of its 515 buses.

The Tri-Met board voted Monday to allow certain types of advertising if it "is in good taste," said East County board representative Bob Murray.

The unanimous vote conflicted with a recommendation by a citizens committee, which said Tri-Met could run into legal problems if it tries to limit advertising.

Its attorney, Cliff Alterman, agreed that legal questions may still arise. But he said the board's restriction against all types of political advertising would probably stand up in court.

The board also specified no more

than one cigarette and one liquor advertisement can be on a bus at one time.

"It was our opinion that they could limit all of one type of advertising, such as political ads, but not less than all," Alterman said. "Once a class of advertising is accepted, they can't have pre-posting censorship."

"If commercial advertising is accepted, they could not exclude any legitimate business."

Murray thinks the board may still have some discretion because of its resolution that the style and form of advertising "be of the highest quality and taste."

The local representative was not as

concerned about limiting the number of cigarette and liquor ads as he was with excluding political advertising. "Political ads could imply Tri-Met endorsement," he said.

His major reason for supporting bus advertising was the increased revenue it will bring the transit agency. The citizens committee reported advertising on the outside of buses would add \$181,000 a year to Tri-Met's coffers. That amount is about 1.2 percent of the agency's annual budget.

"I just don't think we can go to the Legislature and ask for money to operate Tri-Met without looking at all possible sources of revenue," Murray said.

MHCC stuents register by computer

Winter term registration is underway at Mt. Hood Community College but this term something new has been added, the college reports.

This term marks the beginning of on-line computer registration at the college. The system will provide faster registration for students, more accurate information available to students both during and after registration, and increase efficiency to district taxpayers for registration services.

Instead of having to pull and handle a key punch card several times for each class a student wants to take, the registration information is fed directly into the computer via a terminal that resembles a typewriter with a television screen.

College registrar Marilyn Kennedy estimates that the new system is capable of registering one student per minute.

Another new winter term service is telephone registration for night classes. By dialing 667-7238 a night student is connected with a college operator that

will take all registration information over the telephone.

This telephone registration system will be available starting Dec. 11 and will continue through the end of the year on weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Fridays.

Registration for all other continuing or returning and new students taking less than nine credit hours is currently

being conducted in the Town and Gown Room on the Gresham campus Monday through Friday during regular office hours.

New students taking nine or more credit hours will be scheduled to register Dec. 18 and transfer students taking nine or more credit hours will register from Dec. 18 through Dec. 21.

Late registration for the winter term will continue through the second Friday of the term, Jan. 12.

The college has advising specialists and professional counselors available in the counseling center Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The staff is available to give information concerning vocational and occupational programs, college transfer and program information, class scheduling and course choice. Appointments can be made with the counseling center by calling 667-7315.

No more burning till spring, DEQ warns

The backyard burning season ends Sunday at dusk.

Residential burning will be prohibited until spring in Multnomah, Clackamas, Yamhill, Polk, Marion, Benton, Linn, Washington and part of Columbia counties.

Burning is allowed twice a year in most parts of the Willamette Valley to provide citizens with an inexpensive and convenient method of disposing yard clean-up and tree trimmings.

However, commercial and industrial burning is prohibited year-round unless specifically permitted by the state Department of Environmental Quality. Agricultural debris and land clearing debris burning should not be attempted

without first checking with local fire-permitting agencies, a DEQ spokesman said.

State law provides up to \$500 penalty for illegal burning.

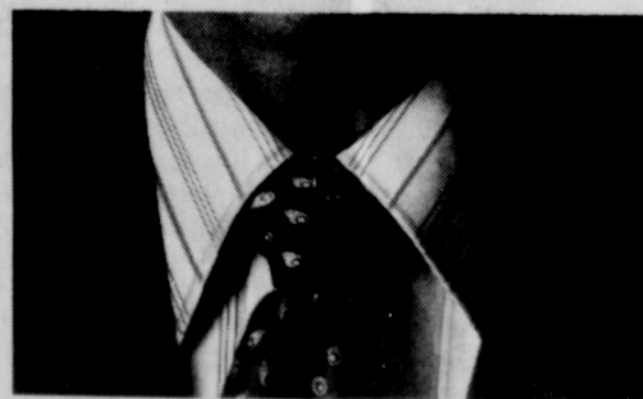
