

Rare coins, jewelry stolen from home

An estimated \$5,000 in rare coins and jewelry was stolen from the home of Jim and Cheryl Wilhite, 42000 SE Highway 26 in Sandy, sometime between Thursday night and Saturday morning.

The theft occurred while Wilhite, who is in the rare coin business in Portland, and his wife and two children were on a retreat at the coast with a church group.

Entry to the home was apparently made by prying open the back door. Stolen were a number of rare un-circulated half dollars, some silver dollars and silver

quarters and other miscellaneous coins. Also taken were more than 20 pieces of rare jewelry that Wilhite had given his wife as gifts during their marriage.

The theft was discovered by friends who came over to feed the Wilhites' dog Saturday. The family did not learn of the incident until they returned from the retreat Sunday.

Wilhite is offering a \$250 reward to anyone with information that could lead to the recovery of the stolen items. The reward will be given "with no questions

asked," he said.

Wilhite said the stolen jewelry pieces are unique and would be very difficult to resell without drawing notice to the seller.

Among the missing items are carved cameo coral jade necklace; another necklace with a Mexican 50 peso gold coin; a silver charm bracelet with 35 charms; an amethyst

necklace; a set of diamond earrings and gold Oriental earrings; a two-piece Peruvian chain necklace, and a 19th century Navajo bracelet.

Anyone with information on the whereabouts of the pieces should contact the Clackamas sheriff's office or call the Wilhites at 668-5300.

High school seniors can make up credits

The fifth-year senior may soon be a thing of the past at Sandy High School. An afternoon school will begin next week to allow students who lack up to three or four credits to make up the deficit before graduation.

The class is also designed for adult dropouts in the community who would like to earn their diplomas, acquire vocational skills, and get a job.

Directed by Lon Welsh, the program was offered last spring under federal funding for dropouts only. This year's class has been modified to allow presently enrolled students to make up missing credits and graduate rather than enrolling a fifth year.

The class will run from 3:30-5:30 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays. "This will allow students in the class to take the activity bus which runs later," Welsh pointed out. The first class is scheduled for next Monday.

"Our top priority will be the dropout, the student who has already left school," Welsh said. "We're looking for a two-to-one ratio of dropouts to currently enrolled students."

But Welsh emphasized the class "is not a G.E.D. program," referring to the high school equivalency certificate. The new course is designed with a vocational emphasis, to provide the student with marketable job skills. Academic skills which are taught will relate to the individual student's vocational choice.

Four vocational areas are offered, including wood-working; welding; and foundry work; automotive repair and secretarial or business skills.

The student enrolled in the

business skills program, for example, would learn math and English as they relate to business. The class includes a placement service which Welsh said was successful in employing "just about all of our students" in the spring of 1978.

"We're going to be most effective with the senior who lacks a credit or so," Welsh said. "We aren't looking for kids who are delinquent in their credits by a whole year or more."

There were 22 enrolled in last year's dropout program. "Those students can be quite a ways behind," Welsh said. "The adult dropouts can be delinquent up to four or five years and still benefit from the program."

The course is based on self motivation, Welsh explained, and aims for individualized and self-paced learning. "The instructor is basically just a resource person," he said.

The program is not federally funded this year. "We're looking for funds to support it," Welsh explained. "It was a valuable enough program that we decided to proceed with it, using money from the general fund initially. But we're applying for grants to absorb the costs."

Hoodland eyes subdivision

The Clackamas County Hearings Officer will hear testimony Jan. 25 on an application by developers to build a subdivision with 44 single family homes and 40 condominiums on 21 acres on Welches Road.

The property, zoned Recreational Residential, adjoins the Rippling River development, a proposed 167-acre resort complex.

Called Fern Dale, the development is being proposed by Fosse and Sons, Inc., a contracting company in West Linn.

Land in the Welches Road area is not suitable for individual septic tanks. In order for the development to be approved, it must have access to a public sewer facility.

A special election will be held Jan. 23 in the Welches, Wemme, Rhododendron and Timberline Rim areas to

determine whether or not a county sewer district will be established in order to build a regional sewage treatment plant.

The Rippling River property is already being developed and the company which owns the resort, American Guaranty Life Insurance Co., has plans to build its own treatment plant if the vote is negative on Jan. 23.
