Forest chemicals eyed

The use of chemicals to deter plant growth in Oregon forests will be taken up by the Northwest Regional Forest Practices Committee on Jan. 31 in Salem.

The committee, which plays an advisory role to the Oregon Board of Forestry, will decide whether or not to recommend specific language in the Oregon Forestry Practices Rulebook on the conditions under which the chemicals may be sprayed.

climate conditions that must be met if the chemicals are to be used.

The committee advises the Board of Forestry on administration of the Oregon Forest Practices Act which is designed to protect the environment during timber harvesting and other wood activities.

In addition to the discussion on the rules at the meeting, the committee will talk about the possibility of

establishing a monitoring system to test waters after herbicide spraying to determine whether chemicals have entered the water.

The committee will also receive an update on current activities, including the need for search warrants to enter some private forest lands to check for rule violations. Landowners' and forest operators' liabilities for reforestation will also be discussed.

The current rule speaks in general terms about the use of chemicals. It states that they must be applied "only in accordance with currently recognized limitations of temperature, humidity, wind and other factors specified by the State Forester."

If approved, the new rules would spell out the specific
