Youth sought for conservation jobs

Applications will be accepted now through March 15 for about 1,000 jobs with the Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) in Oregon this summer.

The youth program is operated by the individual states, the U.S. Department of the Interior, and the USDA Forest Service. The YCC is designed to provide summer employment for youths 15-18 years of age.

"There is no restriction in the YCC in regard to race or economic background," said Kurt Austermann of the U.S. Forest Service, "but applicants must have an interest in the natural environment."

Selection for employment will be by statewide random drawing. Former enrollees are not eligible for a second year, but they are eligible for youth leader positions.

Former YCC participants interested in a youth leader position should apply at a headquarters of the agency that sponsored the camp they attended previously, Austermann said.

Participants in the YCC, a work-learn conservation program, are introduced to environmental problems and contribute to their solutions by working with the management and development of public lands.

The YCC has completed projects involving stream improvement, tree thinning, range fencing, trail clearing, fish and wildlife habitat improvement, wildlife studies, and construction and maintenance of recreation facilities.

Last summer, Forest

Service enrollees accomplished more than \$1 million in resource work.

Young men and women work side by side for eight weeks starting in June, for 40 hours per week.

They are paid the federal minimum wage for 30 hours, and 10 hours per week will be devoted to environmental education. A \$2-per-day deduction will be made for meals and lodging at residential camps.

Persons interested in the program may apply through high school counselors, state employment offices, and other youth service organizations, through the YCC Governor's Commission on Youth, National Forest offices, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Reclamation, Bureau of Land Management and National Park Service offices.

In Oregon, Forest Service camps are planned for the Deschutes, Fremont, Malheur, Mt. Hood, Ochoco, Rogue River, Siskiyou, Siuslaw, Umatilla, Umpqua, Wallowa-Whitman, Willa-

mette, and Winema National Forests.

There will also be several resident and nonresident camps and projects operated by the Department of the Interior and by cities,

counties and the state.

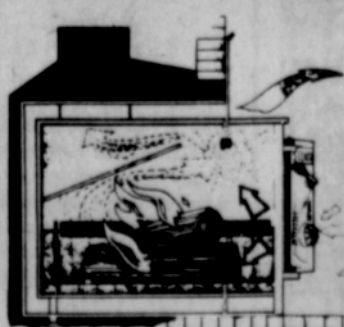
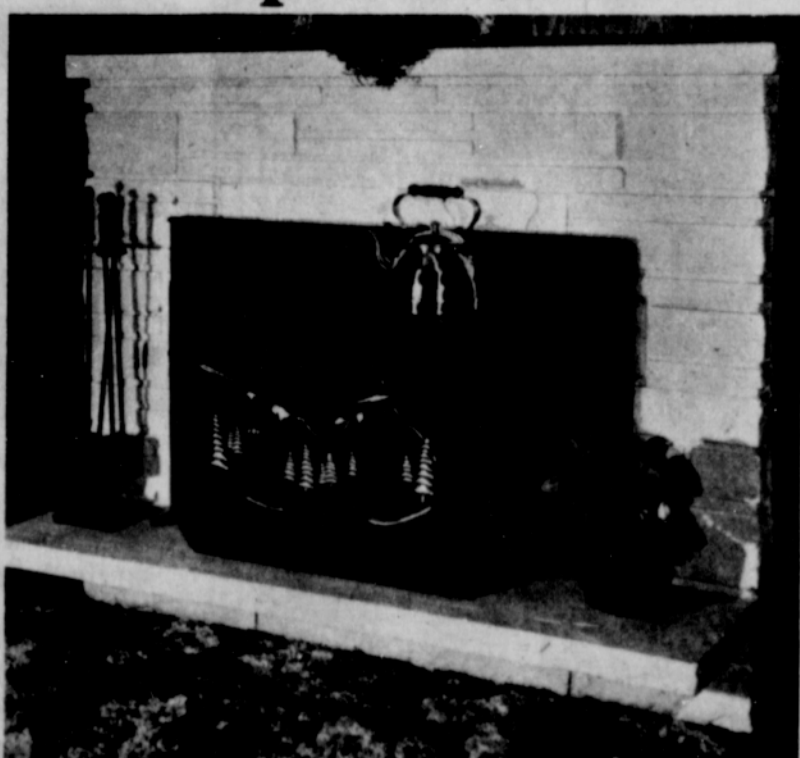

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Taxpayers OK \$12,000 to Demos, GOP

SALEM — The Oregon Department of Revenue has mailed checks to the state's Democratic and Republican parties for contributions designated on 1977 income tax returns.

The Democratic Party received \$7,498, the Republican Party \$4,099. The checks were the fourth quarter disbursement from the \$1 political contribution check-off on last year's (1977) income tax returns.

Most of the 1977 contributions were distributed earlier in the year, as the returns were processed. The total contributions for the year, including the newest distribution, were \$172,674 for the Democratic Party and \$92,465 for the Republican Party.

1977 was the first tax year that Oregonians could designate \$1 of their taxes to a political party. The \$1 check-off has been continued and appears on the 1978 return.
