Fireboard positions open

Three of the five positions on the Hoodland Fire District Board of Directors will be open for election April 3.

Two of the positions are for four years, and one is for two years.

Persons interested in filing for election to the board must live within the district

boundaries or own property there.

In order to file, a petition with at least 25 signatures of registered voters living in the district must be obtained; or a prospective candidate may file an Affidavit of Candidacy and pay a \$10 filing fee.

Petitions or affidavits

must be turned in to the Clackamas County elections office by Feb. 27 at 5 p.m.

The three positions up for election are Position 1, four years, held by Milt Fox; Position 2, four years, held by Gary Cleland; and Position 3, a vacated two-year position, held by Keith Bowman.

Emergency number

Hoodland also plans for 911

The Hoodland Fire Department is making plans to change to the 911 telephone number for emergencies at the same time the system is introduced in the Sandy area.

Fire chief Don Armintrout said this week he will recommend the new number be brought into use to the district fire board at its meeting Monday night.

The Sandy Fire District plus the Sandy Police Department, Alpine Ambulance and the Clackamas County Sheriff's Department are making plans to adopt the 911 system within the next 1½ years. General Telephone Co., which serves Sandy, has indicated it would be willing to install the switching equipment at no cost to the district.

The Hoodland fire district is served by Continental Telephone, but Hal Lincoln at the company's Silverton office said the technical problems of hooking the lines at the same time as Sandy could be overcome without the great deal of expense.

"We really think this could be a good thing for our area," Armintrout said this week.

Armintrout has been negotiating with Continental about the 911 system for the past several weeks. "The cooperation they have shown

us has been excellent," he said.

"If they had come back to us with some large dollar figure on the cost of the system, we couldn't have done it."

The Hoodland district does not have the same problem which Sandy has of numerous residents with several exchanges. A small number of residents in the Hoodland district with 668 exchanges live in the Cherryville area. But they

will be able to call 911 to report a fire because the two systems will go into effect at the same time.

The same would be true for residents in the Sandy fire district, which has 622 exchanges.

Armintrout also said the department plans to exchange its dispatch center from Boring to C-Com in Oregon City this summer. C-Com is a possible location for the 911 dispatch center when it is installed.

Horticulture meeting set

The 24th annual meeting of the North Willamette Valley Horticulture Society will be held Feb. 21 and 22 at the Gresham Armory, 500 NE Division St.

The meeting, which starts at 9 a.m. both days, will deal with two important crops in the North Willamette Valley. The first day is devoted to berry growing and the second day to vegetable growing.

Topics will range from the birds and bees (keeping the former out of crops and the latter in them) to specific plant diseases and production techniques. Speakers will be authorities in many fields from all over the West Coast. There will be floor displays of the latest in farm machinery, equipment and harvesters for use in fruit and vegetable production.

A noon dinner prepared by the Multnomah County Farm Bureau ladies will be served each day at a nominal cost. Coffee will be available throughout both sessions.

Membership in the society is a requirement of the meeting. Membership is open to anyone with an interest in agriculture, a spokesman said, and will be available at both sessions.
