

School benefits eclipse for GI's

Approximately 11,000 Vietnam-era veterans in Oregon will lose their entitlement to GI Bill educational benefits during the next year.

The figure represents the total number of veterans who will have reached the tenth anniversary of their separation from military service, according to Donna M. Arndt, director of the Veterans Administration regional office in Portland.

The law provides veterans with a ten-year time limit to use educational and training benefits.

VA estimates on a nationwide basis more than half the number of veterans who have GI Bill eligibility today will lose it by 1984.

"What we're emphasizing," Arndt explained, "is the time factor. To make maximum use of GI Bill rights a veteran must be aware of the ten-

year limit and get started well before time runs out."

A typical Vietnam era veteran, for example, might have left the service in 1973 having earned maximum training or educational entitlement. If that same veteran were to embark on a full-time, four-year college program, it should be started this year so it can be completed by 1983 when the eligibility expires. Benefits would be payable only until the veteran reached the time limit no matter how far along the program was.

"There are so many ways the GI Bill can be adapted to individual needs and circumstances," Arndt said. "I wouldn't want anyone to lose their rights to this program simply because they let time slip by."

She urged Oregon veterans who believe they may be eligible to call the Portland VA office.

Hoodland firefighters work to free men from wrecked car

Wreck pins 3 men under car

Three men were found pinned in a smashed car off Sleepy Hollow Road Tuesday morning.

Steven George Entenmann, 18, of Portland and Frank John Archibald, 30, from Sandy were taken to Gresham Community Hospital's intensive care unit where they remain in satisfactory condition with numerous fractures and

lacerations.

The third, Kirk James Briggie, 30, from Sandy was dead when Hoodland Fire Department arrived at 7:30 a.m. His wife, Linda, has been notified.

A Troutdale resident, Michael Dolleen Stroup, heard someone shouting for help while he was fishing on Wildcat Creek. He found the maroon 1978 Honda Accord only a few feet from the creek and down a 25-foot steep bank off the road.

Hoodland Fire Department arrived and called Sandy Fire Department and three ambulances for assistance.

The firemen had to cut away the car to get to the injured men. The car was lifted to remove Archibald's foot, which was wedged under it. Entenmann and Archibald were lifted up the embankment with belay ropes and stretchers.

One of the victims said he had been trapped in the car nearly six hours, since 1:30 a.m., according to Fire Chief Don Armintrout. State Trooper Ken Hodson said apparently the car was east bound when it rounded a curve, struck a tree, and rolled down the bank.

Hodson said it appeared Briggie was driving the car which was registered under his name. Entenmann said he was asleep when the accident occurred and could not remember what happened.

County rezoning affects thousands

Notices mailed to 20,000 property owners last week announced Clackamas County's proposed rezoning of a 340 square mile area and set information meetings for April 9, 10 and 11 to explain the proposal prior to Planning Commission public hearings. Land affected ranges from east of Wilsonville and Canby to Molalla, Estacada and Sandy and is the area covered by last year's Rural Plan Amendment.

Information meetings are scheduled for Estacada High School on Monday, April 9; Molalla High School on Tuesday, April 10, and Oregon City High School on Wednesday, April 11. All are at 7:30 p.m.

Exact locations of proposed zones and the limits or opportunities that each provide will be explained by Dominic Mancini, Assistant Planning Director, and Ardis Stevenson, Coordinator for Environmental Services.

Recommended zoning ranges from one-acre minimum lot sizes in rural centers like Colton to zones with minimum lots of 20 acres or more in agricultural and forest areas. The map in the property owners' notice shows locations for eight different zones and seven

specific sites where no change is proposed for existing commercial and industrial zoning.

Areas classified as "agriculture" in last year's plan amendment are proposed to be zoned either Exclusive Farm Use or General Agricultural. Both zones provide for homestead lots. Minimum lot size in the EFU zone is 20 acres. In the General Agricultural District all new lots require review and approval.

Areas classified as "Forest" in the Comprehensive Plan are proposed to be zoned Transitional Timber (20-acre minimum) or General Timber (review and approval needed for new lots). Both of these zones also allow for Homestead lots.

Zones proposed for "Rural" areas are Farm Forest (10 acre lots), Rural Residential Farm Forest (5-acre lots) and Rural Agriculture (2-acre lots).

Rural centers are proposed to have one-acre lots. Commercial and industrial zones are also proposed for a few limited areas.

The citizen information meetings precede by two weeks the Planning Commission public hearings to be held in the same locations.
