

## Tri-Met rejects shuttle

The Tri-Met Transportation District cannot honor a request by organizers of the Sandy Mountain Festival to provide a free shuttle bus service during the festival.

That word was received this week by Darrell Dempster, a member of the festival committee. The committee had requested service on July 7 and 8.

Robert Prowda, director of marketing for Tri-Met, said the district's policy "with regard to free bus service emphasizes service to the handicapped and senior citizen community."

The organizing committee has made arrangements with the businessmen in the Sandy Industrial Park to provide free parking for a large share of the estimated 50,000 visitors the festival will draw. However, the

festival site is two miles from Industrial Park and moving that number of people presents a problem.

Prowda, in an earlier letter to the committee, offered the services of Tri-Met at a price. He said one bus could be supplied for \$660 less farebox receipts at 25 cents per ride. He estimated that that would bring in \$100 to \$160, leaving approximately \$500 for the festival to pay.

However, the Sandy Mountain Festival is a non-profit organization and no admission charge is made to the public. Dempster said the festival committee would not have funds to provide for the shuttle bus.

"We need somebody with liability coverage who could provide the services," Dempster said. A double-

decker bus might be available, but that would require paying the insurance premium.

The 1978 festival attracted a crowd of approximately 50,000 people for the two-day event and parking became a serious problem. Dempster has made arrangements with local churches and the high school to provide parking, in addition to the Industrial Park facilities.

Prowda said the Tri-Met budget is "severely limited," and that most donated service the district provides is for training handicapped individuals on how to use the bus.

Officially no new action has been taken, but Dempster said he has several ideas which he will bring before the committee at its next meeting.

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## Board dismisses teacher

The Sandy Grade School District Board voted unanimously Monday to accept the recommendation for dismissal of a Sandy Grade School music teacher. The teacher, Jerry Dickson, was notified of the recommendation in a letter, dated March 28, from Superintendent Clark Lund.

In that letter, Lund cited the teacher with being "in-subordinate by failing to adhere to district policy and administrative directives in use of physical discipline with students."

The action came as the result of an incident on March 13 involving Dickson and a student.

In the letter, Lund said action taken by the teacher was in violation of the policy established by the district, "as well as the provisions of the student handbook that

defines the type of discipline that may be used."

The board based its action on a presentation by Don Robertson of the Oregon Education Association, who represented Dickson, and testimony by students and employees.

In the letter to Dickson, Lund said he was recommending the dismissal "in the interest of the students, for the good of the district, and to protect the district from future possible litigation."

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
