

Police report:

Auto wreck injures five

The Sandy Police Department experienced a quiet week, according to Police Chief Fred Punzel. That is, it was quiet until Monday afternoon when two automobile accidents occurred within an hour of each other, he said.

Monday afternoon, four Portland residents and a Sandy resident were taken to Portland hospitals after the vehicles in which they were riding collided.

According to Sandy police, a 1970 Plymouth driven by Suzanne Tabler, 28, of Portland, was traveling east on Market Street. She pulled out onto Highway 211 after her view was apparently hindered by a steep bank and was struck by a pickup truck driven by Joan Holm, of Sandy, which was traveling south on the highway.

Tabler, her two daughters, Kathy, 8, and Sonja, 5, and a friend Ricky Warren Miller, 25, all of Portland, were taken to Kaiser Hospital in Portland.

Mrs. Holm was hospitalized for observation. Her husband, Gary, and son, Luke, were not hospitalized.

Sandy police had responded to another accident less than one hour before in which two vehicles collided on Tupper Road, north of Sandy Heights.

One vehicle, driven by Don Conn, was southbound on Tupper Road when it collided

with a vehicle driven by Carl Worley.

Worley left the scene, according to Sandy police, and his vehicle was recovered on Bornstedt Road 20 minutes later. He was arrested and charged with reckless driving and hit and run.

Last Wednesday, Williams Thriftway reported a theft at 11:58 a.m. Two juveniles were taken into custody after they had allegedly taken \$6.88 in merchandise from the store.

A criminal trespass and criminal mischief were reported Thursday, May 10, at the D and B Plaza apartments. Someone broke a \$30 window and entered a vacant apartment. According to the police report, it appeared as if the person spent the night in the apartment. Sandy police are investigating.

Ernesto Arquieta of Colorado Road in Sandy, was arrested and lodged in the Clackamas County Jail for an alleged parole violation Thursday afternoon.

Friday, a policeman was harassed by an unleashed dog. The officer informed a person representing the owner about the city's leash law.

A burglary occurred during the early morning hours Friday at Hood Machine Co., according to the police report. It has not been determined what was

taken and police are investigating. Sandy police responded to a loud music complaint on Sunset Street early Saturday.

A non-injury traffic accident Saturday at the corner of Proctor Boulevard and Revenue Street was turned over to the Oregon State Police. Corporal Dan Wolf of the OSP had seen the accident involving Mark Kendle of Milwaukie and Brian Tupper of Portland. He conducted the investigation.

Mr. H.H. Hazelett reported that someone broke the windshield of his car with a beer bottle on Pleasant Street. That occurred Saturday.

Sunday morning, police responded to a disturbance at Toni's East. A fight was in progress which the officer broke up. He reported that it was "mutual combat" and neither person wanted to press charges.

Later Sunday morning, police responded to a noise complaint in the parking lot of Paola's Pizza Barn. Some youths were "hot rodding" and went home quietly when contacted.

Michael Joseph Grassl, of SE Boitano Road, escaped injury when his automobile crossed three lanes of traffic and hit a sign belonging to Janz Berryland. Grassl reportedly fell asleep as he was driving east on Highway 26.

Sandy police had a car towed from Bornstedt Road because it offered insufficient clearance and was creating a hazard Sunday.

The Sandy police took a stolen vehicle report as a courtesy to Multnomah County officials after a vehicle was reported missing from Stone Road and Highway 26, also on Sunday.

Youth baseball seeks funds

Sandy boys and girls are selling candy throughout town for baseball uniform and equipment funds, shorted this summer by recent cuts in the city budget.

The association fields summer baseball teams for pre-teen Sandy boys and girls who square off in local league competition.

This summer, however, the association reports a \$1,500 shortage in operating funds to buy new uniforms, bats, balls and bases for school fields they use here.

That's approximately the amount the association has come to expect annually

from the city of Sandy as a supplemental budget donation through the city's 20-year-old summer recreation program.

This year, however, the city was forced to tighten its fiscal belt after a state auditor suggested the city was operating in the red and had to rebudget.

To make their annual candy drive more meaningful to the young ballplayers, the association will award 10-speed bicycles to the two youths who sell the most candy. Other prizes include a cassette player-recorder and a portable

radio.

Other prizes are a savings bond, a curling iron, a basketball, two cases of pop, a bracelet, after shave and perfume, and several gift certificates.

Prizes have been donated by local merchants including Coast to Coast, Pioneer Electronics, Clackamas County Bank, Hairline, Williams Thriftway, Sharon's Food King, Sandy Mobil, Grokett's Jewelry, Sandy Rexall, Decker & Scales, Sandy Office Supply and Gordon Stone's.

The association's season started a week ago.

Sandy High VP resigns

Sandy Union High School board met Monday night for the final representation of the district's budget. The district will ask voters for a \$1.6 million levy for its operating budget in the June 26 election.

The board adopted a calendar for the coming school year in which spring vacation was changed from the fourth week to the third week of March.

Diane Cuchens, vice-principal in charge of curriculum, submitted her

resignation at the meeting. It was accepted by the board. Dr. Cuchens is leaving to take the position of curriculum director for the Sherwood School District in Washington County. That district voted to hire Dr. Cuchens the same evening.

The board hired a new art teacher, Robert Carsons from Parkrose, and heard Superintendent Jack Peters' announcement that the high school graduation would be held outdoors in the stadium.

The outdoor ceremony has been the district's tradition, but last year's ceremony was held indoors, Peters said.

Barbara Boswell appeared before the board, presenting a petition bearing approximately 90 signatures, which requested evaluation of the duties of William McFarlane, the high school's principal.

McFarlane has been on earned sick leave since last week, under the advice of his physicians.

Modifications set for sprinkler law

The sprinkler system ordinance proposed by Sandy Fire Chief Bob Rathke has been sent back for modifications by the district's board of directors.

At its meeting Tuesday, May 8, the board recommended modifying the original proposal to include only new construction and remodeling. It also suggested that the district attempt to make the ordinance part of Sandy's Building Code.

Acceptance of that idea would "give us a track record," according to Rathke. "In five years, maybe we could go back and require it of existing buildings."

For the next board meeting, Rathke said the district will prepare a proposed ordinance.

Initially the district recommended that sprinkler systems be installed in buildings of public assembly with an occupancy over 100 people. Buildings over 5,000 square feet on the ground floor or more than one story, regardless of square footage, would have been required to install the sprinklers.

Indignation on the part of local businessmen who claimed that installation costs would have been

prohibitive prompted a reappraisal of the proposal. It did, however, allow 10 years for compliance and that, Rathke said, was "a reasonable amount of time."

Rathke said that the built-in systems would lower fire protection costs to Sandy taxpayers. At two informational meetings held when the proposal was initially presented at the end of March, he said that without the ordinance, the fire district would have to purchase a \$175,000 ladder truck in two years. That requires an additional 10 volunteers to man the apparatus. Each volunteer costs the district \$570 per year. An additional three paid personnel would be necessary at \$19,000 per year.

The fire district operates on a tax base approved in 1976.

In other action, the board named Tom Bennett as the Captain at the Dover substation. He was the number one scorer on a competitive test. He replaces Spike Fleischman.

The district will hold a public budget hearing at the next regular board meeting on June 12. Final adoption of the 1979-80 proposed budget is scheduled for July 10.

Roy Tupper

Roy B. Tupper, a long-time Sandy resident, died May 15 at his home. He was 85.

Mr. Tupper was born Feb. 25, 1894 at Dilly, Ore. He was the third of eight children of Ben and Liza Tupper.

He moved to the Sandy

area in 1936 and owned and operated a sawmill at Welch. He moved it to the Sandy location on Tupper Road in 1942, continuing to operate it until his retirement in 1960.

His wife, Ada, whom he married in 1914, died in 1976. Mr. Tupper was a member of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church and donated much of the material for the church building.

He is survived by his children, daughter, Carol Bakke and son, Myron, both of Sandy, and son, Forest of Missoula, Mont.; two brothers, Harry of Auburn, Wash., and Melvin of Glendale, Calif.; a sister, Edith Purdy of McKinleyville, Calif.; 11 grandchildren, and 14 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be arranged by the Sandy Funeral Home and held at the Sandy Adventist Church.

Alfred Gustav Schosnig, a fifth grader at Sandy Elementary Grade School, died as a result of an automobile accident in Hood River, May 5. He was 11.

Alfred Schosnig was born in Portland on May 6, 1967. He moved to Boring with his family in 1971 where he lived at the time of his death.

He was a member of the Hoodview Seventh-Day Adventist Church.

He is survived by his father, Albert; mother, Olga; one brother, Manfred; one sister, Lydia; and his grandfather, Adolf Hawk of Germany.

Funeral services were held May 9 at the Hoodview S.D.A. Church. Burial was in Douglas Cemetery.



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
