Traveling evangelist chooses Sandy as home

After spending four years as a traveling evangelist, Marty Colvill is looking forward to "settling down" in one place. Colvill just assumed his duties as youth pastor and minister of music for the Sandy Assembly of God Church.

Evangelism was exciting but lonely, Colvill said. He travelled throughout the northwest states and into Canada, preaching and singing.

"I love to travel," he said. "And I enjoyed meeting so many different people. But sometimes I'd be alone in my car eight to 10 hours a day. One summer I had a cat to travel with, and I was really grateful for its company."

Colvill anticipates that the stable experience of his local associate pastorate will provide some welcome experiences. Forming long-term relationships with those he ministers to is one of them.

"Here, I'll be able to grow with the people," he said. "I'll be with them when they cry, and with them when they're happy. They'll see me the same way."

Colvill held an associate pastorate in the Seattle area before he entered evangelism. He said the traditional ministry, with the pastor spending years working at one church, also

presents some potential problems.

"You can get stale," he said. "If you aren't actively involved in a prayer life, and are just in a rut, doing the same thing week after week, you can stagnate. The people can sense it, too."

The Assembly's senior pastor, the Rev. Raymond Alcorn, likened the situation to marriage, where a danger of monotony also appears.

"Two people who are wrapped up in each other can grow bored," he said. "But if they are together doing something beyond themselves, it keeps them from stagnating."

Alcorn explained that a church group must also reach outside itself to prevent boredom from setting in.

Colvill agreed. "The best way to keep from going stale is to maintain variety," he said. "I may not focus on the kids in the church—we may all focus together on the young people outside the church, the ones on the street. But I sure won't hole up in my office."

Colvill said when he was visiting Sandy before his move here, he drove around the city's streets late at night, watching the youth.

"My heart went out to them," he said. "I saw them with their tobacco and their dope, some of them staggering because they were drunk."

"But I never saw a smile on their faces," he continued. "The expressions on their faces almost said, 'Hey, somebody help me!' A person in my early years reached out to me that way. I hope to be able to do it for kids now."

Colvill prepared for his ministry by studying at Northwest College in Kirkland, Wash., with a double minor in Biblical literature, communications and preaching and in counseling.

The Rev. Alcorn pointed out that counseling was an area in which Colvill would strengthen the existing youth program.

"We've never had a youth counselor before," he said. "It was always something the pastor handled. Now, with Marty, it will be part of the youth ministry."

Colvill will lead out in several weekly singing and discussion meetings for the 35 or so church youth. Monthly recreational outings are also scheduled, and he is planning a special series of meetings in September with a singing group.

"The previous youth director here gave the kids a fantastic base," Colvill said. "I don't have to build a foundation for my work here—there's one already established for me to build on."

Local administrator gains national recognition

Brother Andrew Rank, SSP, President of St. Jude's Home and a state licensed administrator, was named to a Fellow in the American College of Nursing Home Administrators in May at the annual convocation of the College held in Detroit, Michigan, in recognition of "service beyond the ordinary professional demands and continuous adherence to the ethical and professional standards of the College."

This advancement to Fellow represents the highest level of membership the College can bestow on a member nursing home administrator.

Fellowship requires at least two years of full membership in the College, at least four years of acceptable training, a record of

participation in the professional and educational activities of the College, and endorsement for Fellowship by three other Fellows.

The American College of Nursing Home Administrators is a professional society for men and women who administer facilities for long term health care and facilities designed to promote, preserve and sustain the well-being of the aged.

St. Jude's Home, es-

tablished in Sandy in 1963 by the Society of St. Paul, now has four licensed administrators, three of whom are Fellows in the College, and one who is a Nominee. Father Rene' Bozarth, SSP, is a retired Fellow in the College.
