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South Bluff gets resurfacing soon

The Sandy Public Works Department will begin resurfacing South Bluff Road this summer with funds approved by voters in the recent levy election.

In the budget message, Roger Jordan, city manager, said there would be "an increased emphasis on street improvements. This year's budget envisions \$10,000 cost of oversizing and \$38,000 cost for South Bluff and Meinig Street improvements."

In addition, the city will begin engineering Tupper Road for improvements to be completed in the next fiscal year, 1980-81.

Jordan foresees completing the job begun on Meinig Street by the Clackamas County road crews. He said that they had

applied a "skim coat" and under a cooperative plan, a two-inch coat of asphalt would be applied and the road would be brought up to county standards which call for a 28-foot asphalt roadway.

Under the cooperative plan, the city will take over the responsibility for Meinig after the county's improvements are completed.

Jordan said the City has applied for federal funding to help with the South Bluff resurfacing and that it is "high on the priority list." The resurfacing will go on as scheduled with or without the grants, however.

The city will also provide some partial resurfacing along North Bluff Road.
