Support sought for victims

A typical rape victim is not a young, good-looking teen-age girl wearing shorts.

That's a stereotype that should be buried and forgotten, according to Roi Holkinson, director of the Clackamas County Rape Victim Advocate Program.

Rape is a crime of violence, not sex, she added. Rape victims can be 2 or 90. Their common characteristic is that they are vulnerable and unaware.

"It's a case of a person being in the right place at the wrong time."

Holkinson is looking for volunteers to provide support services for Clackamas County victims of sexual crimes.

The RVA program's 15 volunteers are overburdened, Holkinson said, due to an increased number of people reporting sexual crimes.

"There now are more cases entering the judicial system and going to court," she added. "We need some people to help us out."

The Clackamas County RVA program was started in May 1976, and since that time volunteers have been presenting information in schools, civic organizations and private homes.

"These volunteer hours are spent in the belief that a better informed public can reduce the occurrence of these violent crimes," Holkinson said.

Holkinson said public information provided by her group, along with the media and members of the county crime prevention unit, has had an effect on the number of reported rapes.

"More people are coming forward and saying that they had a crime committed against them," she said.

"They know they're going to get help from both our office and the police," Holkinson added. "(District Attorney) Jim O'Leary is interested in prosecuting

these cases, so it makes it a little more comfortable for the victims."

The main service provided by volunteers is giving support to crime victims and their families.

Volunteers may be called on to provide crisis counseling for a 55-year-old woman who has been raped and sodomized, or give emotional support to an 11-year-old who was sexually abused.

Volunteers also might be called to assist a 15-year-old boy who was sodomized by another male.

Requirements for rape victim advocates include being over 21, having a valid Oregon driver's license,

insurance and use of a car.

Holkinson said volunteers are required to have one 24-hour duty period each month, commit themselves to six months in the program and to attend training sessions and monthly meetings.

Volunteers meet victims at the hospital or police station, and stay with them through the collection of evidence and during the formal statement to the police.

"If there's a suspect, (the volunteer) may be with the victim during the formal identification," Holkinson said. The rape victim advocate also stays with the victim during any court procedures, including grand jury trials.



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New Bookmobile schedule announced

Clackamas County Library Bookmobile has moved to new days, times and, for some communities, new locations. The new schedule went into effect this month.

"We've honed the schedule to 26 stops, down from 49," said Dick Tuffli, library director. "Gasoline shortages, inflation, costs of labor — these were reason alone for cutting back. But a year of monitoring patron response and usage at each stop also proved we needed to make some changes."

Statistics show that some communities merited increased Bookmobile service, via longer hours and more visits each month. The volume of circulation in other localities was too low to retain them as Bookmobile stops and still be cost-effective.

"When deleting communities, we made sure patrons would still have library service nearby. Stops

remaining on our schedule are all centrally located, within easy access to neighboring areas. In other cases, patrons live very close to a full-service public library, which offers far more than a Bookmobile," Tuffli said.

"The Bookmobile is a good supplement to a patron's library needs, but it's not a substitute for a public library," he said.

Patrons in the Mt. Hood area now have their Bookmobile visits scheduled biweekly, rather than the past practice of grouping all Hoodland stops in the same week.

The Bookmobile will stop at Government Camp's post office from 10 to 11:30 a.m. on the first Wednesday of each month. It will also stop at the Hoodland shopping center in Welches from 12:30 to 3 p.m. on the first Wednesday.

The new schedule shows that the library-on-wheels

will visit Rhododendron at the Sentry Market from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and the Brightwood Store from 1:15 to 3 p.m. on the third Wednesday of each month.

The Bookmobile will stop at the Aims Community Church from 10 to 11:30 a.m. and at the Western Farms Market in Boring from noon to 1:30 p.m. on the fourth Wednesday.

"Clackamas County's Bookmobile began operating in the 1930s, as a WPA

project," Tuffli said. "Back then, more folks lived in isolated rural areas. But times are changing, and we've got to reflect today's pace. We have a much larger, moving population, with more people commuting to work in town, instead of staying home on the farm."

Books housed in the Bookmobile also reflect a change in the library's approach to readership.

"Our library is aiming to

meet the recreational interests of patrons, as well as the educational. Readers want to be entertained.

Rather than supply them with academic treatises, we buy how-to-do-it, popular fiction paperbacks, and books that appeal to hobby and leisure interests," Tuffli said.

All county patrons may check out as many books as they want, for a month at a time.
