## Group will show films

The Mountain Film Society, under the joint sponsorship of The Studio and The Store of Wemme, was formed recently to offer mountain residents an alternative form of entertainment.

The non-profit organization presents films every Thursday evening at 7:30 in the Women's Center on Salmon River Road.

The first film was shown last week to "a good crowd of about 35 people. I was encouraged by it," said Will

Frank, one of the founding committee members. The films were originally scheduled to be shown at Bowman's, but due to a policy change by Red Lion, the location was forced to change.

Tonight, "Reefer Madness," filmed in 1936, along with a Betty Boop cartoon festival, will be presented. Considered a classic, "Reefer Madness" is a government propaganda film about drug abuse.

Many classic films are to be shown in coming weeks including: Feb. 28, The

Wrong Box; March 6, Ship of Fools; March 13, African Queen; March 20, Kluge; March 27, Wait Until Dark; April 3, Cat Ballou; April 10, On the Waterfront; April 17, The Wild One; and April 24, A Rebel Without a Cause.

Advance tickets may be purchased at The Studio or The Store for \$2.75, or for \$3 at the door. The ticket price also entitles the bearer to become a member of the society, which, among other things, enables him or her to have a voice in the selection of future movies to be shown, according to Frank.

## County fair boosters form

Since it began as a sort of tent city farm festival over 70 years ago, the Clackamas County Fair has evolved into an established tradition for generations of Clackamas County citizens.

To keep that tradition alive and to enhance the impact of the annual event on the region's social and economic life is the goal of a group of fair enthusiasts who want to form a Clackamas County Fair Boosters Club.

Sparked by Geraldine Herdt of Tualatin, the group has scheduled an organization meeting for Thursday evening, Feb. 28, at the main pavilion on the fairgrounds at Canby. Time for the meeting is 7:30 p.m.

"The fair means a great deal to thousands of Clackamas County residents and we'd like to see a lot of them at the Feb. 28 meeting," Herdt says.

The Tualatin woman has been conducting highly successful monthly flea markets at the fairgrounds to benefit the 4-H building fund, but she said this activity

over-all fair effort.

"Our fair, among the tops in Oregon, is a valuable community asset and we cannot afford to let its grounds or facilities deteriorate," Herdt says.

She said that a dedicated organization such as a fair Booster Club could generate needed public support and raise money for fairgrounds upkeep.

Noting that there has been much grass roots agitation for more citizen participation, Jerry Mickelsen, fair manager, says she is pleased with the initiative being taken by Herdt and her group.

"Many people don't realize just how completely the county fairgrounds complex has become a year around facility," Mickelsen said.

This year's fair, the 74th annual event, will be held Tuesday through Saturday, August 12-16. The 1980 theme, Mickelsen says, is "An Old Fashioned Fair."
