Funeral services for Florence Arlene McSweeney of Eagle Creek were held Saturday at Carroll Funeral Home in Gresham. Private interment followed at Forest Lawn Cemetery.

Mrs. McSweeney died Wednesday, March 5, after suffering a heart attack. She was 67.

The couple came to Oregon in 1941 and settled in the Gresham area.

Also surviving are 25 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren.

Ruth Young

Funeral services for Ruth E. Graybill Young of Boring were held Friday at Holly View Baptist Church. Private vault interment followed in Damascus Pioneer Cemetery.

Mrs. Young died in a Gresham hospital Tuesday, March 4, at the age of 91. She was born in Hope, Kan., where she attended school and grew to young womanhood. In 1913 she graduated from Kansas State College with a teaching degree.

Mrs. Young taught in Idaho and Kansas before marrying Owen O. Young in 1918. The couple lived in many states during the following years, including Alaska, where Mrs. Young taught.

In 1951, the Youngs returned to Idaho and settled on a farm by the Snake River. They moved to Boring approximately five years ago.

Survivors include her husband, Owen; sons, David Young of Boring; daughters, Mary Louise Ernst of Phoenix, Ariz., Jeanne Oliver of Los Angeles; sister Lillian Svenchanchky of New Jersey. Also surviving are 14 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

The Sycamore family is filled with individualists. Sometimes they are wild and zany, and they are nearly always oblivious to what is happening in the world around them.

The Sycamores arrive in Sandy Friday evening at 8 p.m. in the Sandy Community Players production, "You Can't Take It With You."

The setting is 1938 and Roosevelt has just instituted the WPA program and relief payments. None of the Sycamores held a job during the Depression and got along just fine. In their three-generation family home, they have a fireworks factory in the basement, a candy factory in the kitchen, a printing press in the living room and they haven't paid income taxes for 24 years.

In addition to the family, the Sycamore house is inhabited by a group of oddballs, characters and drifters who have come and gone through the years. The milkman made a delivery one day and stayed for seven years. He left only because he died.

Grandpa (played by Ken Tebo) is the family patriarch. His favorite pastimes are darts and snake collecting. Penny (played by Shirley Lawson) is his eldest daughter and the clan's matriarch. She is generally writing five plays at a time and finishing none. She developed the talent when a typewriter was delivered by mistake eight years earlier.

Her husband Paul (Mike Bailor) reads Lenin and plays with his erector set when he isn't manufacturing fireworks in the basement. Penny's daughter Essie, (Judy Sheppard) dances everywhere she goes. She even makes candy in her ballet costume while her husband Ed (Hank Emrich) plays Beethoven on his decrepit xylophone when he isn't printing the dinner menu on his printing press.

Rheba the maid (Glenna Dickman) always seems to have something ready for supper even though the refrigerator is filled with corn flakes. Her boyfriend Donald (Tony Griffin) always brings a jar of flies

for Grandpa's snakes when he visits.

Another frequent visitor is Kolenkhov, (Larry LaMarsh) the mad Russian ballet teacher who rants and raves about Stalin and the world in general. Kathy O'Neill is cast as Alice Sycamore, an island of sanity in the household. She falls madly in love with the boss's son Tony (Arnie Poutala), who is fascinated by and drawn to the wild family.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kirby (Ken Fox and Jackie Whitlock) show up for a memorable dinner. A ginswilling actress (Andrea Bailor) assists Penny in finishing a play. A pipe-smoking drifter (Linda Challender) spends her days making fireworks with Paul in the basement. A real Russian grand duchess (Marlene Tebo) rounds out the cast of zanies that live in the Sycamore abode.

Arson suspected in cabin fire

Sandy Fire District personnel and members of the Oregon State Police arson squad are investigating a fire which destroyed a small cabin on Marsh Road Friday evening.

LaVerle Wiser was the resident in the cabin owned by Thomas C. Burton of Clackamas. It was located at 12757 SE Marsh Road.

Volunteers from the Roslyn Lake substation were the first to respond to the alarm which was called at 10:50 p.m. When the three volunteers arrived on the scene at 11:01 p.m., the building was totally involved in flame, according to Jim Gallagher, district fire prevention officer. The blaze was under control at 11:07 p.m.

"They did a good job for us. They made it real easy to do the investigation," Gallagher said. The three Roslyn Lake volunteers were

joined on the scene by three other volunteers from the area who went directly to the fire scene.

Loss was estimated at \$1,500.

The fire district responded to 60 alarms during February, "a little below average for us," according to Gallagher.

Thirteen fires were reported; three structure fires (all minor); four chimney fires; four grass or rubbish fires, and two other fires.

The Emergency Medical Service teams responded to 36 first-aid calls in February. Of those 16, were minor first aids; eight were victims who walked into the station; four were heart attack victims; seven were the result of vehicle accidents (all minor), and one victim was dead-on-arrival, according to the monthly report.
