The Oregon State Fair Floral Gardens are being planted, pampered and groomed as opening day for the 1980 fair moves closer. "Most garden spaces have been reserved, but some space still is available," according to Pat Moran, superintendent of the Floral Gardens.

"Space is available in the Floral Building for those wishing to display arrangements, potted plants, cut flowers, bonsai or hanging baskets," Moran said. Clubs, individuals or professional exhibitors may obtain more information on entering by calling the Oregon State Fair at 378-3247.

"Deadlines for exhibits vary," Moran said, "with cut flower entries being accepted up to opening day, Aug. 23. Some exhibits will change on Thursday, Aug. 28, for the last half of the fair," he said. The fair ends Sept. 1.

A new program in the Floral Gardens this year will be twice-daily tree climbing and tree fertilizing demonstrations for the homeowner. Staff members of the Oregon Aboriculture Company of Portland will show the proper use of gear and tools in climbing and trimming trees and techniques and formulas for fertilizer application. Fertilization programs will be at 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. Climbing and trimming demonstrations will be at 3 and 7 p.m.

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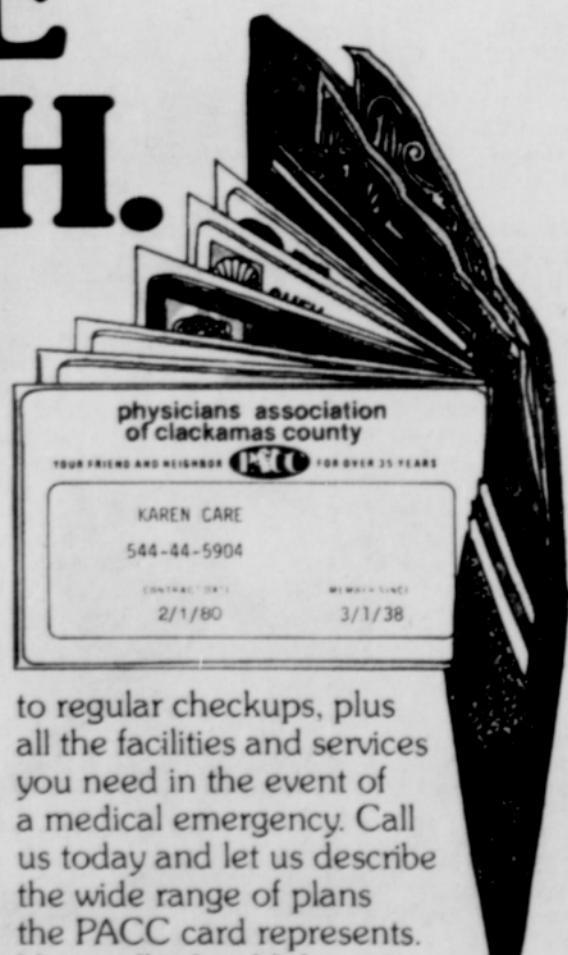
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
