

Subdivision in Welches to be considered

A subdivision application that could create five new homes in the Welches area will be considered by the Clackamas County hearings officer at 10:30 a.m., next Wednesday, Aug. 27, in Conference Room D at the Department of Environmental Services in Oregon City.

Dale Jensen of Mt. Hood Properties proposes to subdivide 8.78 acres into five lots for single family residences. A waiver of the width-to-depth requirements of the Subdivision Ordinance will be considered.

Special consideration will also be given to the Principal River Conservation Area along the Sandy River.

The property is located on the north side of Highway 26, approximately 1,200 feet east of the intersection with Welches Road in the Welches area.

Thursday, a Clackamas County hearings officer will consider a variance and minor partition application at 7 p.m. in the County Courthouse in Oregon City.

William R. Houston is proposing to waive the 10,800-square-foot lot size requirement on the zoning district in Government Camp to allow the partitioning of a 15,000-square-foot lot into two 7,500-square-foot lots.

The property is located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Second Street and Beta Street in Government Camp.

Interested persons are invited to attend these two hearings. The hearings officers will consider all testimony and written correspondence in making their decisions.

The applications are available for inspection at the Department of Environmental Services, Planning Division, 902 Abernethy Road, Oregon City.

Film explores family trials this Monday

The epidemic of shattered families in America is devastating not only to parents and children, but to society itself.

"The Family Gone Wild," a film to be shown Monday at the August meeting of Sandy Kaffee Klatsch, takes its viewers from San Francisco's "red-light district" and the prison yard at San Quentin to the homes of America's affluent.

It shows interviews with the victims — prison inmates, revolutionaries, prostitutes, homosexuals, divorcees — and those who deal daily with the results of families out of control — police chiefs, prison chaplains, psychologists, legislators.

"But 'The Family Gone Wild' shows that the victims can become the victors," said Edna Cooke, chairman of the Kaffee Klatsch Committee. "Through Jesus their shattered lives have been restored and redeemed. The fatherless have found The Father. The unloved have become the loved."

"The outcasts of society have become those fighting the hardest to preserve its greatest strength — the family."

Ken and Bobbie Wold, staff members at East Hill Church in Gresham, will moderate the film which will be shown at the Sandy Community Center.

Dawn was in California for a delicate operation to remove a tumor on her brain. After the all-day surgery, doctors said the tumor was

benign and their worries about her speech and sight were unfounded. They will be all right.

Now she will recuperate for 10 days before returning to the community that has embraced her plight and demonstrated an outpouring of generosity not often found in larger towns.

At an organizational meeting to muster support for a fundraising campaign

to help with the medical bills, 31 persons showed up from various civic, service and private groups. With them, they brought fundraising ideas or a promise that they would meet with their individual groups to come up with some.

Since that meeting, more groups have contacted the organizers and the support is growing. Sandy Community Players

will hold a benefit performance Sept. 13 for Dawn. The Mount Hood Movie Club will donate the profits from its September film, "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," to the cause. It will be shown Sept. 28 in the Sandy Theater.

Representatives ranged from the grade school children she attended school with to people who knew of her family and wanted to help. Continental seeks hike

Continental Telephone of the Northwest filed two requests for changes to its schedule of rates and charges with the Oregon Public Utility Commissioner last Monday, Aug. 11.

The first request is for reclassification of six of the company's exchanges, including the Hoodland area.

"According to the company's commission-approved rules and regulations," said George Pappani, state manager for Continental, "exchange rates are based on the size of the local calling

area. The Hoodland exchange has grown and is now in the next higher rate group."

Pappani said the new basic monthly local service charge for the exchange would be as follows:

For residential customers, one-party, \$6.75; two-party, \$5.40, and four-party, \$4.75.

For business customers, one-party, \$14.85; two-party, \$13.50; four-party, \$12.15; key line, \$22.30; multi-line, \$14.85, and semi-public paystation, \$18.60.

Pappani said that the company expects the new

rates to go into effect sometime around Sept. 10.

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The second tariff change adds a fifth element to service connection charges. This element, "premises visit," would have a \$10 charge, and would apply only to those customers whose request for telephone installation or change in service required that work be done at their home or business.

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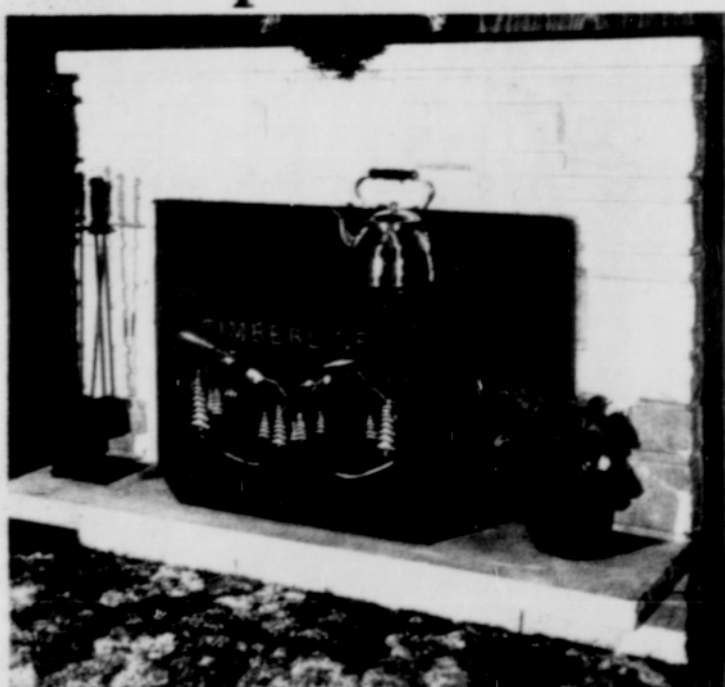
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
