

Free lunch meal policy announced

Sandy Elementary District last week announced its policy for free and reduced price meals and free milk for children unable to pay full price. The aid comes under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast and Special Milk Programs.

School lunch prices will rise 10 cents this year, according to Superintendent Clark Lund. Lunches for children in grades 1-6 will pay 60 cents per meal and students in grades 7-8 will pay 70 cents.

The cost of the reduced price meals will also rise from 10 cents to 20 cents. Milk prices will remain 5 cents.

Local school have adopted a family size income criteria for determining eligibility. (See graph.)

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free meals, reduced price meals and/or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but

with other unusual expenses, due to high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses, are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the school office.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If families have foster children living with them and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, the local school principals will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the principal, he may discuss the decision with an informal basis. If a parent wishes to make

a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to the district superintendent, who will act as hearing official, at 39065 Pleasant St., Sandy, 668-5541, for a hearing to appeal the decision.

The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should file a new application. Such changes

may affect the eligibility of the children.

Each school and the office of the superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

'10 Little Indians' audition set

"It's great," Fox said. "I've always been intrigued with this particular play since it's beginning."

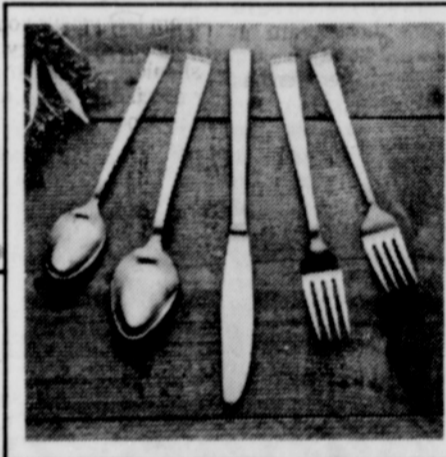
