Renters reminded of right to detectors

If you own rental units, you'd better make sure they are equipped with smoke detectors.

Owners of rental dwellings, apartments and motels may be held legally liable for damages that result from lack of smoke detectors.

Since July 1, smoke detectors have been required in rented quarters where people sleep. The law requires owners to install and maintain the detectors;

tenants are required to conduct periodic tests.

"We get lots of calls from people wondering about the new law and some complaints from occupants saying that a detector isn't in," said Jim Gallagher, fire prevention officer for the Sandy Fire District.

"We've had real good luck by just calling the owners up and telling them about the new law," he said.

The option is an automatic \$250 fine if the owner refuses to install the detectors, Gallagher said.

"We've never had to go that far, and we hope we don't," he said.

"A renter has a right to be protected by a smoke detector," said Clyde Centers, Oregon fire marshal.

The law also requires that owner-occupied dwellings be equipped with a smoke detector at the time of sale.

"It would be helpful if realtors and other professionals involved in home sales would advise sellers of this requirement," Centers said.

He said his office has

received many reports of fires where detectors saved lives and property, but also some reports of detector failures. The most common cause of failure is due to a dead battery.

"Every smoke detector should be tested at least once a month," he said.

In the Sandy area, residents are apparently getting the smoke detector message.

The district's education program is working so well that even district personnel were surprised by the results

of a smoke detector survey last spring in which 75 percent of those questioned indicated that they use detectors.

"We've had real good luck in our area," said Gallagher. "We think it's higher now."

Gallagher said he has sold an average of 18 smoke detectors every two months since the new law went into effect.

He also said district residents should be sure to make frequent battery tests.

County to hear farm use variance

The creation of three lots through a non-farm use application will be considered by the Clackamas County hearings officer at 7 p.m. this Monday, Jan. 5, in the County Courthouse.

Frank and Vivian Gokey propose to create three lots of approximately 8.26, four and four acres respectively. Single family residences, not in conjunction with a forest use, will be built on each of the four-acre lots.

An existing residence will be located on the 8.26-acre parcel.

The property is on the south side of S. Colorado Road, approximately one-fourth mile east of its intersection with S. Moonbeam Drive, in the Sandy area.

The property is currently zoned transitional timber 20-acre minimum lot size.

The application is available for inspection at the Department of

Environmental Services, Planning Division, 902 Abernethy Road.

Auditions called for play

Auditions for the Sandy Community Players next production, "The Curious Savage," will be this Sunday, Jan. 4, at 2 p.m. at the Sandy Community Theatre.

Rehearsals will begin next Wednesday, Jan. 7, and the production will open March 13 and run for three weekends.

"The Curious Savage" was written by the highly-acclaimed, award-winning playwright John Patrick, who also wrote "Everybody Loves Opal" which was performed by the Players a year and a half ago. The play is a comedy with interlaced moments of poignant drama.

"The ability and potential to develop a strong character from the specific role you are

trying out for is going to be a key criterion in casting," said Jim Wilhite, director.

"One of the strengths and delights of the play is the strong contrasting characters, each having a unique personality. For this reason it would be advantageous to read the script prior to the auditions. There are roles that may be cast with people who have no prior theatrical experience," he said.

There are 10 characters in the play and parts for five men and five women, ranging in ages from 16 to 65. Copies of the script may be obtained on 48 hour loan by calling Wilhite at 661-0219 during the day, and 668-3330 in the evening.

Tryouts will continue until 5:30 p.m., then an hour break will be taken. Callbacks will begin at 6:30 p.m.

There are several positions open on the production crew to assist with set building, props, makeup, costumes, publicity and promotion. Persons interested in becoming involved in production are urged to attend the tryouts.

Plans are being made to provide child care at the theater during rehearsals for people with small children who would like to participate in the play. Qualified teenagers will provide supervision and planned activities in the costume room at the theater.

District reports quiet week

The Sandy Fire District reported a quiet week over the Christmas holiday.

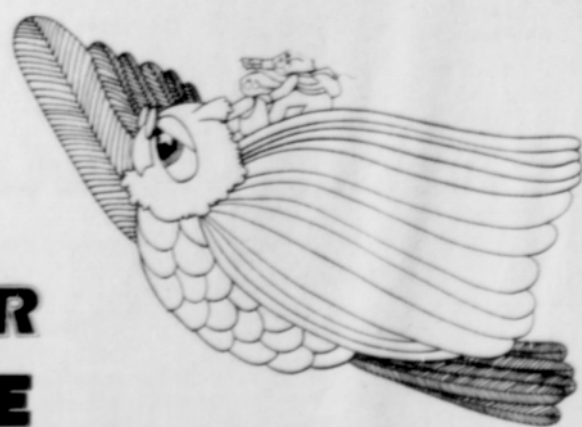
