

# Sisters gain equestrian fame

BORING — Kelli Bailey had a hard act to follow.

In 1977, her sister, Traci Knudson, won All Around Western Junior Rider (for horsemen 17 and under) at age 13 in the Oregon Horsemen's Association circuit. Traci also won the championship in a number of western pleasure and other competitions that year, attending 50 shows in 11 months.

But now Kelli, 11, is rivaling her sister. While Traci, 16, continues to show and place, Kelli is setting records on her own.

Although she only began showing in 1978, she was "hi point" or reserve "hi point" (10 and under class) in Appaloosa shows in Grants Pass, Roseburg, Central Oregon; and Oregon Appaloosa Club show; and the Southwest Washington, Columbia River, Mount Rainier and Farwest shows,

all in 1979. A "hi point" champion has the most accumulated points from competitive events entered in the champion's age group.

Kelli was the Oregon Appaloosa Youth Club's all-around champion that year as well.

Last year, she was the "hi point" champion in the 10 and under class at the regional Appaloosa show "Appa Jack" in Olympia, Wash., where she also was the reserve all-around. The list goes on.

"Kelli really spends all her time in the barn...we never see her," says her mother, Donette Bailey.

It was Donette's own love of horses that eventually rubbed off on her two daughters, who were both riding by the time they were two years old, she says.

"It's fun," says Kelli, who is paying back her father, Mick Bailey, the cost of her

horse "Mike" by cleaning the chrome on the two trucks in his trucking business. (She has \$990 to go, she says.)

Kelli has been riding on Mike since June, 1980, but won most of her awards riding the family's retired 25-year-old Appaloosa named Frosty.

Both Kelli and Traci receive their riding instruction from their mother, who serves as both personal chauffeur and financier for her daughters — driving them to all shows and doling out the required entry fees. In 1978, she even drove them to their first national competition in Billings, Mont., in a new motor home bought for that purpose. "I have a \$10,000 ribbon," says Traci, laughing.

But both Kelli and Traci are going to wait awhile to enter nationals again, they say. Although Traci placed third in western equitation

and both girls earned other honors, the experience was less than thrilling.

"There was a black-out, an oil refinery nearby blew up, part of the highway caved in (because a water main broke), there was a stabbing and shooting and these people threw some puppies out on the highway. It was awful," says Traci.

"Wasn't that the time the mayonnaise fell on my head?" asks Kelli. (It was.) On the way home, their motor home also "blew up," notes Donette.

In any case, Kelli will start in on the Appaloosa circuit once more this year, her first show scheduled in May. She may also enter in the "Lots of Spots" Canadian show in Langley, B.C., in August, if her mother has her way.

And in the meantime, she'll keep visiting that barn...and cleaning those trucks.

# Trojan's 1980 energy production high

Electricity produced by the Trojan Nuclear Plant in 1980 was the equivalent of 170 gallons of oil, 3,000 pounds of coal or two-thirds of a cord of wood for each of Oregon's 2.6 million residents.

Trojan produced more than six billion kilowatt hours of electricity during the year.

It would take 10.6 million barrels of oil, more than 4 million tons of coal or about 1.75 million cords of wood to produce an equivalent amount of energy.

"We're extremely pleased with Trojan's performance in 1980," says plant manager

Paul Yundt. "Trojan not only ran well, it produced the electricity at substantially less cost than competing sources."

Nuclear fuel for Trojan cost about \$25 million. Oil would have cost about \$370 million and coal, delivered to Oregon, at least \$100 million.

Wood, at present Portland area prices, would have cost \$192 million to \$236 million.

The 490,000 customers of Portland General Electric Co. received 30 percent of their electricity from Trojan last year. PGE operates Trojan and receives 67.5

percent of its electricity. Full production from Trojan was about 18 percent of the electricity used in Oregon.

"There were only three minor unscheduled shutdowns totaling about 30 hours during the year," says Yundt. "This is a far better record than any of the coal-fired plants in the Northwest region."

Trojan was shut down for 22 hours on Jan. 6 and 7 to repair a pipe in the condenser and again for about two hours on Feb. 7.

Trojan was then out of

service from April 11 to July 16 for refueling and annual maintenance and inspection.

On Oct. 3, Trojan automatically shut down while work was being performed on the main generator control circuits. It returned to operation the same day and has been operating continuously ever since.

As of Sunday, Jan. 18, Trojan had been operating continuously for 107 days.

Each day it operates, Trojan sets a new record for the plant's continuous operation.
