Job outlook on rise in state

Although Oregon's January employment figures are virtually the same as December's, there are indicators that the state's economy is beginning to revive.

That prognosis came from Ray Thorne, administrator of the Employment Division.

"December unemployment was 8.4 percent and January was 8.3 percent, but the real story is told by comparing January, 1981 with January, 1980," Thorne explained.

In that time period, construction, lumber and wood products showed the most improvement. The gap of unemployment in those fields has narrowed.

A bright spot in the construction field is the seasonally adjusted number of jobs, up 2,700 from December.

"That is the first increase in more than a year, indicating that the recession in Oregon may have finally turned the corner," Thorne said.

Seasonally adjusted figures for wholesale and retail trade also showed an increase of 2,000 jobs in January which is another good sign, Thorne noted.

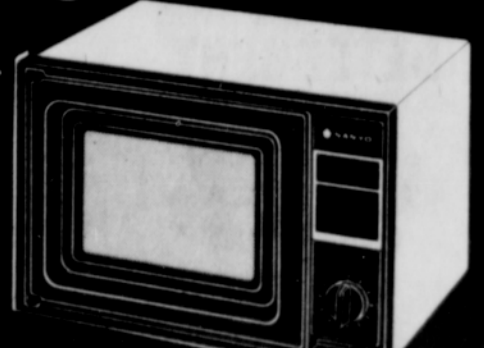
