## Book review

# 'Shelley' offers some Hollywood insight

First, I want to tell you the bad news. The autobiography, "Shelley," has an abrupt conclusion.

We are left with the totally erroneous impression that Shelley Winters went into suspended animation, or "took the veil," after her

divorce from Vittorio Gassman. Also, there isn't an index and that is de rigueur in a name-dropping book.

Now, for the good news — she didn't sleep with the Ayatollah Cockamamie.

She comes through as a combination of "My Gal Sal" and "Lulu's Back in

Town." In tinsel town, along her star-studded path, she had steamy romances with Lawrence Tierney (screen bad guy), John Ireland, Errol Flynn, Burt Lancaster, Marlon Brando and William Holden. Also a few no-count lovers here and there.

Her rehearsals with Ronald Colman and director

George Cukor in "A Double Life" 1947, are the best in the book. The picture was especially good because it was shot in exact sequence. Shelley says, "Only a big director can make producers give the actors this gift. I've done at least 50 movies in which you start with the last scene and go backwards."

Fred MacMurray told her how to pull Hedda Hopper's fans and get a rave review, and it worked. Shelley was one of the chosen few to keep the awful Harry Cohn off balance, and she did it with breath-taking chutzpah, but

others were not so lucky. One time, after a particularly villainous attack on Rita Hayworth, Shelley describes his exit. "Then he walked out with his big cigar in front and his entourage behind."

Howard Hughes was her staunch friend and Marilyn Monroe was her roommate for two years...and so it goes. You'll find it fascinating reading, and when you're finished you will go out and kick your dog.

# Donors needed for eye bank

Sandy area residents will be asked to give the gift of sight during National Eye Bank Month in March. The event recognizes more than 65 nationwide eye banks for eye banks for their efforts to restore sight to people with impaired vision, and encourages donation of eyes.

The Oregon Lions Eye Bank at Good Samaritan Hospital and Medical Center in Portland serves as a receiving, processing, research and distribution center for donor eye tissue.

The eye bank provides the tissue to doctors for cornea and sclera transplant operations.

The cornea is the transparent covering that overlays the iris and pupil, and works with the lens to focus light rays entering the eye. When the cornea is diseased or injured, sight may be restored by transplanting a fresh, clear cornea from a donor eye. More than 90 percent of such transplants are successful.

The only source of tissue is the donation of eyes of

recently-deceased persons. Any person 18 years old or older may sign a donor card in the presence of two witnesses, and carry this card in his or her wallet. The donor card may be obtained from the eye bank, 229-7523, any local Oregon Lions Club or one of 125 funeral homes in Oregon which act as substations for the eye bank.

Also, the potential donor should be sure that his driver's license is marked with a "D" signifying that he is a donor.

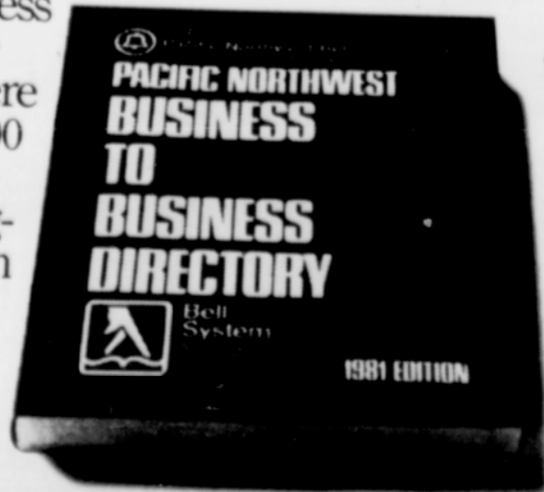
