Marlins fifth in final meet

The Blue Marlin Aquatic Club ended its winter season last weekend by placing fifth in the Columbia Basin Swim League Area 2 Championships.

The Salem Aquatic Club hosted the meet at Willamette University.

Salem also won the meet with 2,314 points. Greater Columbia was second, 1,791; Forest Grove third, 1,078; Tigard fourth, 782; and the Marlins fifth, 485.

The BMAC was led by its eight-and-under swimmers in the age-group meet.

Michelle Crane placed second in the 50-yard freestyle, 38.4; second in the 25-breaststroke, 20.5; third in the 25-backstroke, 21.1; and third in the 25-butterfly, 20.5. Her time in the breaststroke was a new Blue Marlin record.

On the boys side, Damon Hodge was picking up all kinds of points for Sandy. He won the 25-butterfly in 17.0, which was not only a BMAC record, but a Columbia Basin record as well. Hodge also took second in the 25-breaststroke, 21.13; third in the 50-freestyle, 35.64; and fifth in the 25-backstroke, 25.73.

Travis Hilstad was third in

the 25-breaststroke with a 21.2, but he had a 20.7 in the prelims for a new BMAC record. He also placed third in the 25-butterfly, 18.49; and 12th in the 50-freestyle, 40.4.

Jeremy Quiett was 11th in the 25-breaststroke in 27.76.

In the boys 10-and-under, Ian Hodge placed 12th in the 50-freestyle with a 33.14 time.

John Tuttle placed in four swims for 11-12 boys. He was ninth in the 200-individual medley in 2:46.6, ninth in the 100-freestyle, 1:05.6; furth in the 100-breaststroke, 1:21.7; and 10th in the 100-backstroke, 1:20.7.

Troy Hilstad was third in the 100-butterfly, 1:11.3; and seventh in the 100-backstroke, 1:17.7.

Mark Rolph was 10th in the 100-butterfly, 1:21.8; and 12th in the 100-breaststroke, 1:30.0.

Deane Haines placed seventh in the 100-butterfly in 1:15.0.

In the 13-14 girls, Terry Hanson was ninth in the 200-individual medley, 2:41.9; 12th in the 100-freestyle, 1:08.4; ninth in the 100-backstroke, 1:19.7; and seventh in the 100-butterfly, 1:15.8.

In the boys competition,

Doug Crane place first in the 100-butterfly, 1:00.7; third in the 200-freestyle, 2:02.9; second in the 100-freestyle, 54.9; and third in the 200-individual medley, 2:21.4.

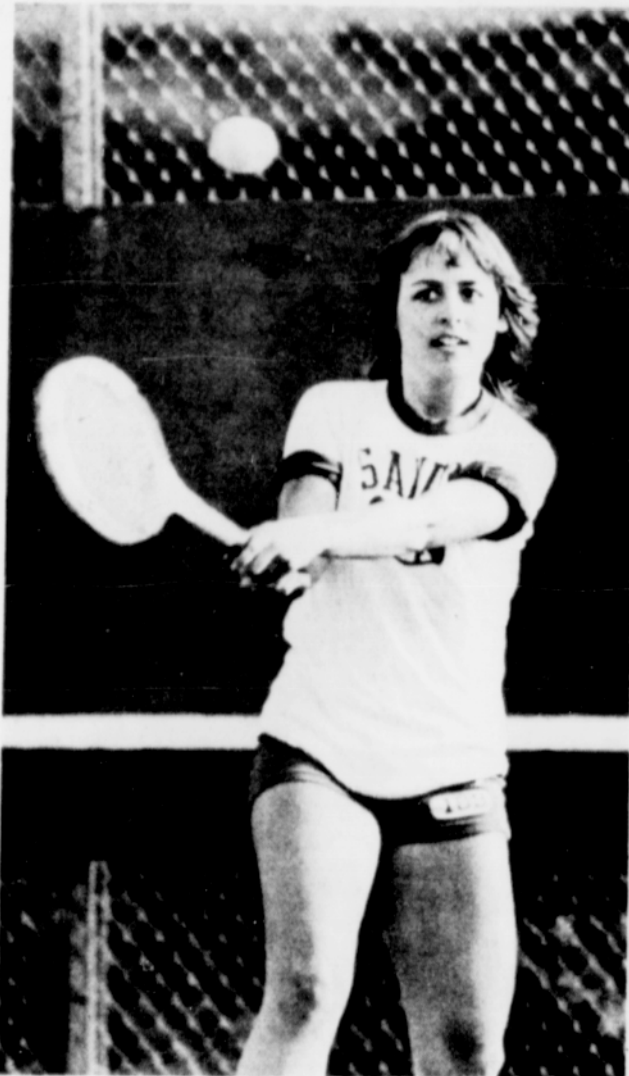
Jamie Tuttle was second in the 100-breaststroke, 1:12.5; ninth in the 100-freestyle, 59.5; ninth in the 200-freestyle, 2:15.8; and eighth in the 100-backstroke, 1:14.8.

Richard Rolph was fifth in the 100-freestyle, 58.7; seventh in the 200-freestyle, 2:07.2; sixth in the 100-backstroke, 1:10.4; and fifth in the 100-butterfly, 1:11.8.

In the senior division, Jean Crane was sixth in the 100-breaststroke, 1:22.0 and eighth in the 200-freestyle with a 2:19.9 time.

Rick Topliff was seventh in the 200-individual medley, 2:14.7; eighth in the 100-freestyle, 52.88; fourth in the 200-freestyle, 1:55.7; and ninth in the 100-butterfly, 1:01.3.

Bret Crane was 12th in the 200-individual medley, 2:21.7; 10th in the 100-freestyle, 56.8; seventh in the 100-backstroke, 1:03.1; and seventh in the 100-butterfly, 59.8.

Singles look strong

Seniors pace Sandy netters

The Sandy girls tennis team is hoping to improve on its fifth place district finish of last year.

The Pioneers may have the team to do it.

Sandy High coach Debbie Hunter has a fairly experienced, senior-laden team this season. And they've also had more court time than their male counterparts, who have logged just a week of practice.

The Pioneer girls have been out for three weeks and are beginning to come around. They play the Gresham Gophers on the road Thursday at 4 p.m., then return home Friday to host Barlow, also at 4 p.m.

Hunter said that the singles competition should be the Pioneers' strong point. Although Sandy lost Janet Bonner, last year's number one player, three seniors return to fill the gaps.

Sandy Yantes will start the season at number one singles and should be competitive in the Timber Valley

League. One of her biggest obstacles is her own health; Yantes has been hampered the last two seasons by knee injuries.

Last year's number two singles, senior Tami Schafer, will return this season to occupy the same spot. Schafer handled most of the number two players in the league last year and was seeded eighth at district.

Yantes and Schafer, although owning contrasting styles, should give the Pioneers strength at singles.

"I have high hopes for Sandy and Tami at district," Hunter said. "It looks like those two could end up in the top five."

The third singles spot will be taken by another senior, Sue Hartke. Hartke played doubles most of last season.

Sandy Shreeve and Julie Coleman played number two doubles last season and return to take over the number one slot. Other varsity returners are Becky Rodrigues and Jody Rob-

bins. The rest of the doubles positions will be filled with players off last year's junior varsity team.

Rodrigues will team up with Patsy Wesselink at second doubles. Alice Schoppert and Denise Shockey will play third doubles and Robbins, Zina Seal and Tracy Tool will alternate at the fourth doubles position.

Hunter said that Estacada and West Linn should be the teams to beat in the TVL, Estacada with its depth and the Lions with their strong individuals.

"We could handle Estacada in singles, but their doubles might give us some trouble," Hunter said.

Canby also has one or two good individuals who might give the Pioneers some problems.

Hunter said that she'd like to "move up a notch or two" from last year's fifth place finish and to beat Molalla this year.

Sandy's first league match will be March 24 at Silverton.
