

Pioneers nab net wins

Debbie Hunter may not be the most accurate prognosticator in the world, but she's coaching a pretty good tennis team.

The SUHS coach predicted last week that her Pioneers would be improved over last year and that it would be the singles players who would stand out.

One out of two isn't bad. The Pioneers are improved, as evidenced in wins over Gresham and Barlow this week. But it has been the doubles teams who have paved the way.

Sandy nipped Gresham 4-3 on the Gophers' home courts Thursday. The Pioneers lost all three singles matches and won all four doubles matches.

Pam Onchi topped the Pioneers' Sandy Yantes 6-0, 6-4 at No. 1 singles; Christina Dorfhuber beat Tami Shafer 6-2, 6-1 at No. 2 singles; and Linda Olinger knocked off Sandy's Sue Hartke 6-0, 6-3 at No. 3 singles.

The 3-0 deficit didn't faze the Sandy doubles teams, however. They coolly proceeded to knock off Gresham four straight and give the Pioneers their first win in re-

cent years over their Wilco League rivals.

At No. 1 doubles, Julie Coleman and Sandy Shreeve outlasted Liz Lock and Lisa Limeaux of Gresham 6-1, 2-6, 6-3. The No. 2 doubles match also went three sets as Sandy's Becky Rodrigues and Pat Wesselink scored a 6-4, 3-6, 6-3 win over Shannon Tong and Lisa Ronson.

At No. 3 doubles, Sandy's Alice Schoppert and Denise Shokey took a 6-2, 6-2 win over Georgina Rhodes and Michelle Stephens. In the final doubles match, Tracy Toole and Zina Seal of Sandy cruised to an easy 6-1, 6-0 win over Debbie Becker and Karen Lee.

Sandy knocked off another old rival Friday, dumping Barlow for the first time in recent memory 5-2. Again, it was the doubles players who led the way, although Jody Robbins claimed the Pioneers' first singles win of the year.

Shreeve and Coleman won at No. 1, sweeping Lisa Hatfield and Sara Thompson 6-2, 6-4. At No. 2 doubles, Rodrigues and Wesselink scored a 6-0, 6-1 win over Jenny Tomlin and Molly

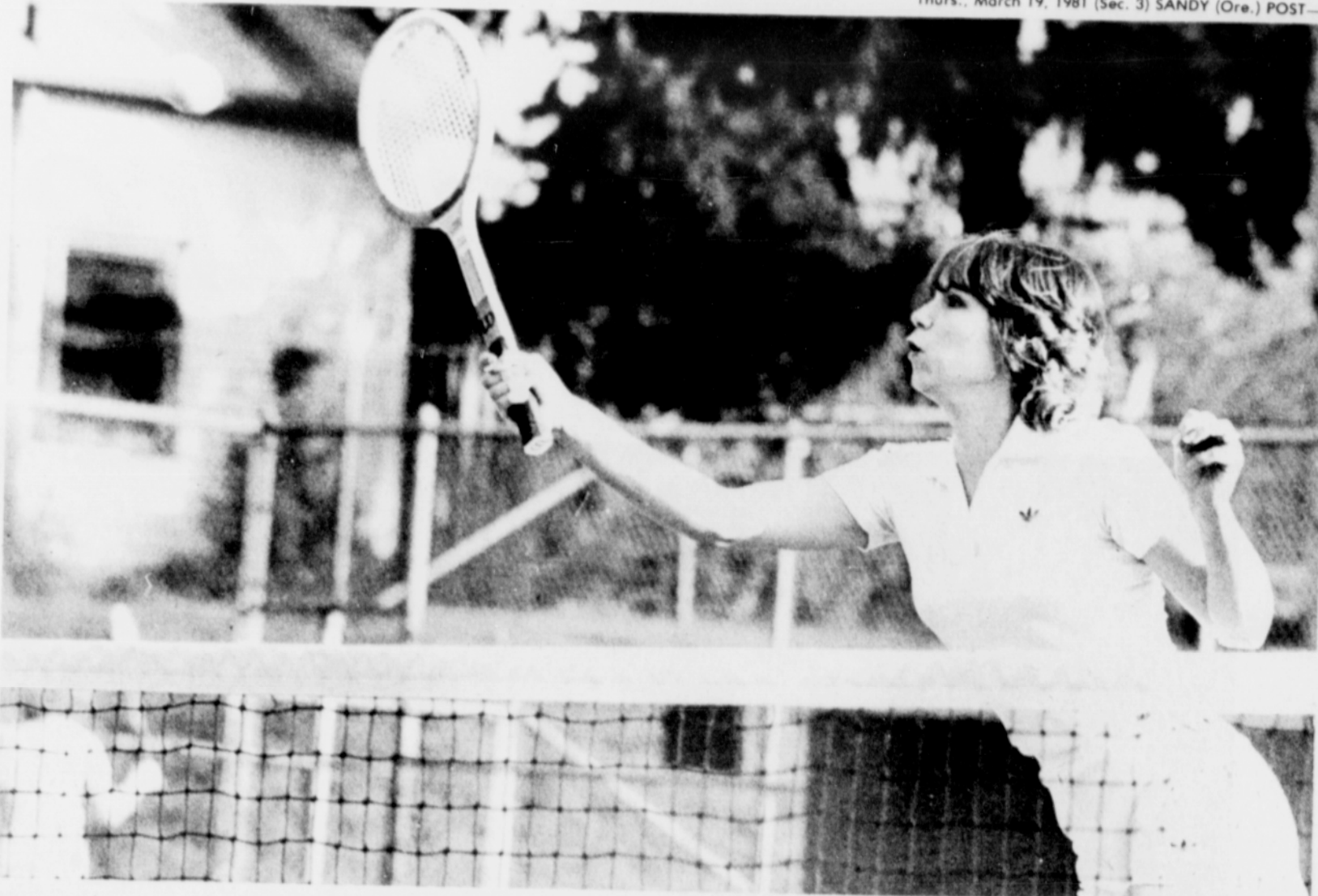

Seal and Hartke teamed up and made quick work of Amber Jones and Ona Wise, winning the No. 3 doubles for Sandy 6-2, 6-0. Schoppert and Shokey won their second straight, taking the No. 4 doubles match over Lisa Arnd and Sandy Bulsik 6-0, 6-1.

Robbins claimed Sandy's initial singles win of the season with a 6-1, 6-2 win over Trina Curl at No. 3 singles. Kris Anderson of Barlow held on to top Shafer at No. 2 singles 7-5, 6-1. Shelly Pudrbaugh of Barlow scored a 6-0, 6-4 win over Yantes at No. 1 singles.

In junior varsity play, Barlow's Jenny Tomlin topped Brenda Yantes 8-4, Sandy's Linda Hilliard and Becky Clift scored an 8-4 doubles win over Jenny Roberts and Kathy Rotramaz, and the Bruins' Karen Reese and Karen Sezig claimed an 8-4 win over Lori Armstrong and Jenny Brosseau.

"The girls played very well this week," Hunter said. "Our doubles teams look especially strong—I think we have some good combinations now."

Rusty netters drop pair

A lack of court time took its toll on the Sandy High boys tennis team this week.

The Pioneers made their season debut and suffered shutouts at the hands of Gresham, 6-0, and Barlow, 5-0.

Sandy coach Terry Chung could manage just one week of practice for the Pioneers and they were rusty going into their matches with Wilco League opponents.

Gresham swept the host Pioneers Thursday, although Sandy's Steve Frost nearly pulled off a win at No. 1 singles. Frost took the first set against Jeff Livermore, but the Gopher ace rallied to win the next two and claim a 4-6, 6-1, 6-1 win.

At No. 2 singles, Gresham's Brian Cayson

scored a 6-3, 6-3 win over Damian Bollermann. Mike Tjader scored a 6-2, 6-1 win over Sandy's Pat Spriggle at No. 3 singles.

Gresham scored straight set victories in the three doubles matches.

Joe Houck and Tom Eubanks won at No. 1 doubles, defeating Sandy's Pete Kallen and Alex Brewster 6-4, 6-0. Dan Dunstan and Bob Masseth scored a 6-2, 6-1 win over Sandy's Harvey Hazelett and Erik Frost at No. 2 doubles. The No. 3 doubles match went to Bill Gangiver and Tom Oslund of Gresham who topped Mark Gunderson and Randy Swanson 6-2, 6-1.

The Pioneers traveled to Barlow Friday and found the Bruins equally as tough.

Frost lost to David Crow at No. 1 singles 6-3, 6-3. Jay Dinneen knocked off Kallen at No. 2 singles 6-3, 6-1 and Brian Baker topped Hazelett at No. 3 singles 6-3, 6-0.

At No. 1 doubles, Barlow's Brent Aim and Erve Keeting overcame Brewster and Erik Frost 3-6, 6-0, 6-0. Wayne Yamashita and Steve Keeling of Barlow took No. 2 doubles, topping Swanson and Eric Jones 6-0, 6-0.

In exhibition matches, Kallen and Hazelett topped the Bruins' Tony Gloss and Theo Cavandran 6-3, 6-4 and Barlow's Ryan Lobas and Jeff Strebin edged Brewster and Erik Frost 8-5.

The next match for the Pioneers will be March 24 when the Pioneers host Silverton.

Energy financing available

Low-cost financing for homegrown Oregon energy is now available, thanks to voter approval of a \$367 million bonding program.

The Small Scale Energy Loan Program (SEL) offers low-interest long-term loans for projects that produce energy from renewable resources or waste heat. SEL is administered by the Oregon Department of Energy (ODOE). The concept was approved by the 1979 Legislature and by Oregon voters in May 1980.

ODOE Director Lynn Frank said the agency intends to sell several million dollars in bonds in May if enough applications are received and approved. Loan funds from that bond sale would be available to borrowers in June. All necessary forms and application information are available upon request from ODOE, Frank said.

"Our staff is prepared to process loan applications immediately," Frank said, noting that ODOE needs

enough approved loans to proceed with the May bond sale. A shortage of applications could delay that sale until Fall.

Interest rates for the loans will vary according to each bond sale, Frank said. The rate is expected to be about 11 percent on loans from the first bond sale.

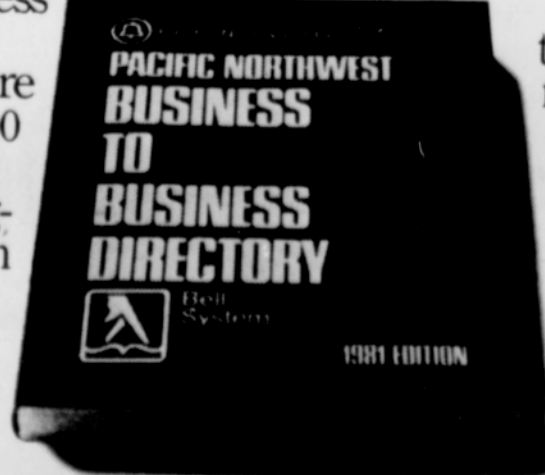
