Unwelcome weeds will accompany new growth

Every spring when plants begin their new year's growth, some unwelcome visitors usually appear.

Weeds answer the call just as fast as their ornamental cousins.

The easiest way to control weeds is to remove them by hand or by hoeing and raking. However, where weeds are widespread and well-established, some chemical weed control may be needed.

Chemical weed control is much easier if gardeners can identify the weeds before beginning a control program.

Each weed control chemical, or herbicide, is unique in that it is more effective in controlling certain weeds and it must be applied at the right time for the best results. The Clackamas County office of the Oregon State University Extension, 655-8631, can help in the identification of weeds.

Some weeds which typically cause problems in home landscapes are field bindweed (morning glory), Canada thistle, horsetail rush, quack grass, tansy ragwort, poison oak and blackberries.

Repeated treatments with 2,4-D amine or dicamba (Banvel) are required for control of field bindweed. Many desirable plants are susceptible to both of these herbicides, so gardeners should use care when applying. Dicamba should not be applied where the roots of desirable plants may be growing.

Canada thistle can be controlled with 2,4-D amine, dicamba or amitrole T (Amitrol-T or Cytrol). Pain-

ing or daubing the leaves of weeds with the herbicide is effective for treatment in areas where spraying is not possible or practical.

To control horsetail rush, apply dichlobenil (Casoron) when precipitation or irrigation is available to move the herbicide into the soil. In areas where Casoron cannot be used, apply amitrole T when the horsetail is fully emerged, usually late June or July. Some followup treatment will be required for complete horsetail control.

Amitrole T or dalapon (Dowpon or Dowpon M) will provide good quackgrass control. Treatment of individual plants by painting or daubing the leaves is effective if spraying is not practical. Repeated treatment may be necessary.

Control of poison oak is best accomplished by using amitrole T or silvex. Repeated treatments may be required for complete eradication. Apply either herbicide when poison oak is fully leaved out. During warm weather, do not apply silvex near desirable plants.

Amitrole T and silvex are also recommended for control of wild blackberries. Repeated treatments may be necessary.

Careful adherence to recommendations for the rate of application must be followed for effective weed control.

To insure that desirable plants are not killed and that most effective weed control is achieved, follow recommendations for rate, timing and mixture of all herbicides.

Rhododendron bushes don't grow near walls

Rhododendron shrubs don't like to have their backs against a wall.

When rhodies are planted very close to house foundations or other concrete structures, the lime in the concrete can be leached out by rainfall and gets into the soil around the rhododendron's roots.

This can be a problem because lime has a neutralizing effect on acid soil and the rhododendrons require acid soils for healthy growth.

The appearance of new growth that has turned white is a good indication that the soil around rhododendron roots has been neutralized.

To correct this problem, apply ammonium sulfate at 1/4 cup per well-established

plant or no more than 1/2 pound per 100 square feet of planted area. If the rhododendrons are mulched, pull back the mulch and apply the ammonium sulfate directly to the soil surface.

Elemental sulfur is also effective in restoring soil acidity but works much slower the ammonium sulfate.

To avoid this problem in the future, plant rhododendrons at least three feet away from foundations or other concrete structures. If you have a severe problem of this nature with a well-established plant, one other alternative is to transplant the shrub away from the source of the lime.
