**Building safety week set by proclamation**

Following Gov. Vic Atiyeh's lead, Sandy Mayor Ruth Loundree has proclaimed next week as "Building Safety Week" in Sandy. The week is to recognize the contribution to public safety made by the officials and inspectors enforcing Oregon's construction codes.

Oregon has had a uniform building code law statewide since 1974.

Effective codes have contributed to a significant decrease in Oregon fire deaths and in favorable in-

surance and homeowner warranty rates within the state. Codes adopted for Oregon use are the National Electric Code, Uniform Building Code, Uniform Mechanical Code and Uniform Plumbing Code.


