Students set for Oregon Business Week

More than 350 Oregon high school students and their teachers are going to college to learn about business.

What's more, they're taking time from their summer vacations to do it.

They will attend the second annual Oregon Business Week, Aug. 16-22, on the campus of Oregon College of Education at Monmouth. Designed to clear up any "foggy ideas" about business, the program last summer attracted 156 high school sophomores and juniors and 30 of their

teachers, including students Shirena Oldfield and Connie Schmitt of Sandy Union High School and their teacher, Len Eaton.

"Enthusiasm of students and teachers attending prompted sponsors to nearly double enrollment this year," according to Paul Hathaway, Northwest Natural Gas vice president and chairman of the Business Week activities.

"That means raising a lot of money to provide attending students and teachers with scholarships," he said.

Sponsored jointly by OCE, the Oregon Council on Economic Education, the State Department of Education and Associated Oregon Industries, the week-long learning experience consists of lectures, seminars, discussions and field trips conducted by a faculty of more than 100 business people.

Students and teachers attending receive full, expense-paid scholarships that include board, room and all instruction materials. They provide only travel to and from Monmouth.

Scholarships are provided by individuals, businesses, Chambers of Commerce and other civic and fraternal organizations interested in providing students and teachers with practical experience in the American private enterprise system, explained Hathaway.

"Potential scholarship donors can obtain full information from their individual Chamber of Commerce," he said.

Each day of the week-long crash course in practical economics is filled with events designed to equip the

students with tools leading to business success.

Study subjects range from market concepts and factors of production to the impacts of inflation and recession. Others deal with regulation, taxation and rights and responsibilities of business, consumers and workers.

An extensive part of the curriculum deals with Oregon's economy, including field trips to operating businesses in the area. Final day is devoted largely to business career opportunities and preparation for entry requirements.

Handbook for woodstove users offers tips

The Oregon Department of Energy (ODOE) has a 'best seller' publication.

"The Oregon Woodheat Handbook" is a new booklet designed to help homeowners realize the energy and money-saving potentials in woodstoves from home heating.

The new booklet is ODOE's response to the woodstove phenomena. Woodstoves are an increasingly attractive home heating option for Oregonians as the cost of fuel oil, natural gas and electricity continues to rise. ODOE estimates that one in every 10 Oregon homes uses wood

as the primary space heating fuel.

A woodstove, chosen carefully to match heating requirements, properly installed for safety and operated and maintained for fuel efficiency and air quality can be a wise investment. But, a woodstove that fails those standards can be a disappointment at best and, at worst, a dangerous fire hazard and source of air pollution.

"The Oregon Woodheat Handbook" stresses care in selection of woodstoves and firewood, proper installation, efficient operation and

regular maintenance. The booklet is an ideal guide for persons considering purchase of a woodstove as well as those who already own one.

The publication is the first element in a comprehensive woodstove information and education campaign funded in part by a grant to ODOE from the Pacific Northwest Regional Commission. Another element of the campaign will be radio and television public service spots in the early summer and fall to coincide with firewood collecting and home heating seasons.

In 10 days, orders for more than 1,000 copies of the handbook were filled by ODOE. Initial public response to "The Oregon Woodheat Handbook" easily matched demand for two earlier publications, "The Oregon Sunbook" and "The Oregon Windbook," according to an

ODOE spokesman.

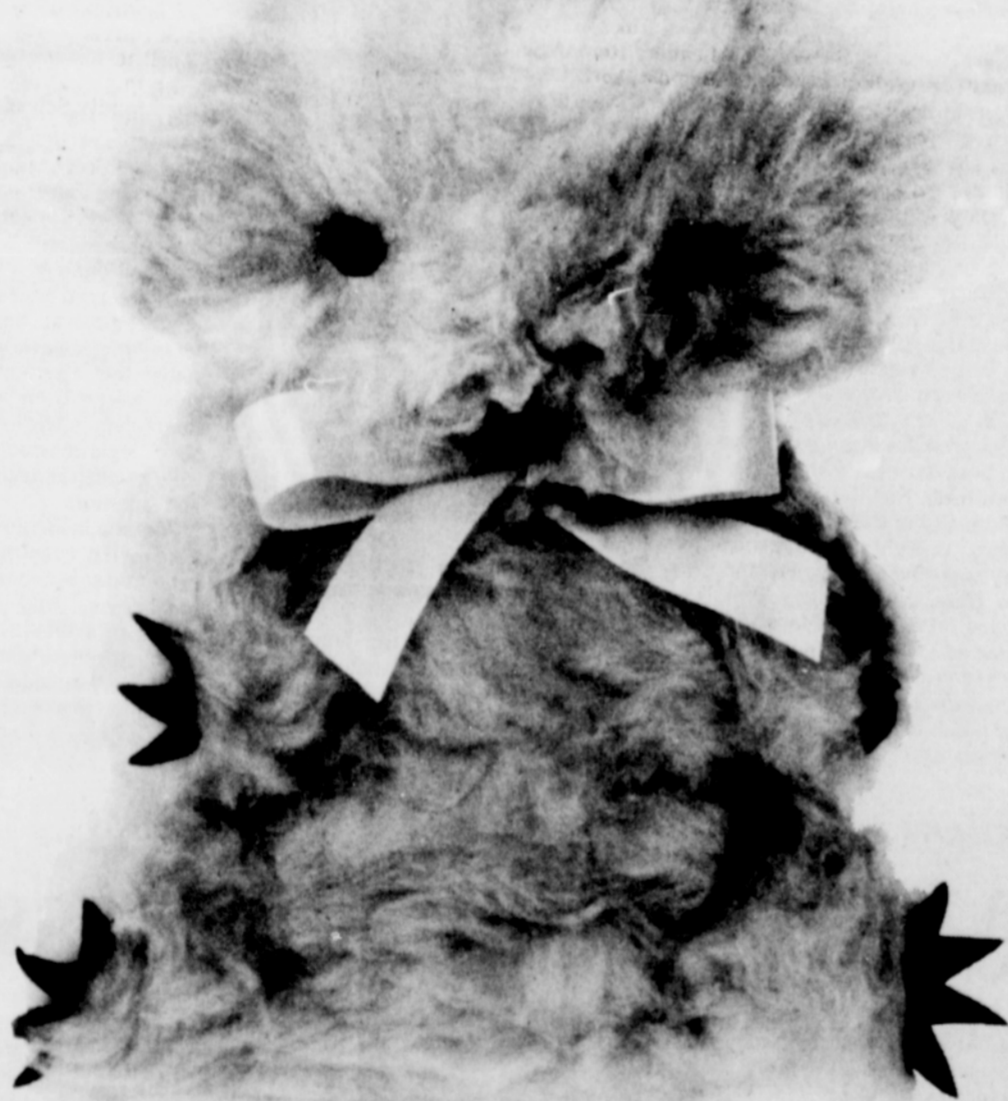
