Contestants in the pageant will be judged on scholastic achievement and leadership, poise, personality and appearance. There will be no swimsuit or talent competition.

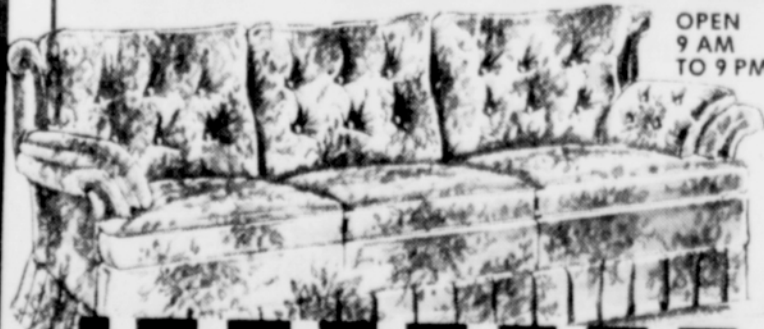
Contestants must also recite a 100-word speech on the theme, "What's Right About America."
