

Mobile home park requested

A conditional use modification and variance application which could lead to a mobile home park in the Wildcat Mountain Road area will be considered by the Clackamas County hearings officer next Thursday, April 16.

The hearing will be held at the Clackamas County Courthouse in Oregon City at 7 p.m.

L.G. Brian proposes to modify a conditional use permit which presently allows

him to establish a mobile home park. The modification would allow him to sell parcels for individual mobile homes or single-family residences, and to reduce the minimum lot size requirement of the FF-10 zoning district to approximately two acres.

one of the lots created will contain four existing mobile homes and a single-family residence.

The property is on the east side of S.E. Brian Ranch

Road, approximately 2,400 feet southeast of S.E. Wildcat Mountain Road, in the Dover area.

At the Thursday hearings, the county officer will also consider a temporary permit application, filed by Frank Stone Jr., to use a mobile home as a temporary residence until a suitable site can be found for it.

The mobile home would be parked on the end of a private road approximately 640 feet south of S.E.

Hauglum Road and 650 feet west of the intersection of S.E. Hauglum Road and S.E. 362nd Avenue, in the Cottrell area.

That area is zoned rural residential farm forest, five acre minimum lot size.

The applications for these hearings are available for inspection at the Department of Environmental Services, Planning Division, 902 Abernethy Road, Oregon City.

Book review

Morality subject of stories

"Infidelities" is a collection of short stories by Angela Huth, an English novelist and short story writer. She has also written radio and television plays

and is a regular television performer in London.

These 15 stories are variations on the theme of moral turpitude, and they are excellent.

They range from the bored wife and mother who is roused from the dull rhythm of

her life in "Monday Lunch in Fairyland," to a secluded couple crumbling away into sodden old age, with their minds and speech set in the time of their affluence.

They have a fixed pattern that keeps them from thinking about the yawning abyss before them. This chilly little story is called "Azaleas for Sale."

My favorite story is the very witty "Loving Gourmets." George invites Diana to accompany him on a holiday in France. Diana imagines making love in

small auberges in the Dordogne, Normandy, Brittany and the South.

We are led through pates of whipped goose liver with truffles, croissants, quenelles, and on to rougets and a poem of a cheese soufflé. Then, a sharp little muscadet, sorbets, an exotic pastry oozing with cream and fraises du bois.

This goes on for a week or so. Diana returns home plumper but unsullied. Her mother need never worry about George... his affections lie elsewhere.

Two students finalists for Merit Scholarships

Seniors Damian Boller-mann and Jim Beatty have been awarded Certificates of Merit for distinguished performance as finalists in the 1981 Merit Scholarship competition, principal John McMahan of Sandy Union High School announced last week.

The National Merit Selection Committee chooses a limited number of finalists from among the field of 15,000 semifinalists who

were chosen last fall. High scores on the P.S.A.T. and the Scholastic Aptitude Test constitute the criteria for placement as a finalist.

Some of the finalists will receive scholarships of \$1,000 while others receive scholarships ranging from \$1,000 to \$8,000, which are used over a four-year period.

Though not all finalists receive scholarships, most of these students will receive awards from other agencies and organizations — frequently from colleges and universities that are eager to enroll students of high academic caliber.

PGE bolsters Sandy coffers

The city of Sandy received a check for \$34,381.27 the first of April from Portland General Electric Company.

According to Bob Kallen, PGE Sandy district manager, the funds are franchise fees paid by the utility for business it conducted in the city during 1980.

"The franchise fee is based on 3 1/2 percent of PGE sales in Sandy, with the exception of a small percentage taken out for uncollectable accounts," Kallen said.

PGE will present checks totaling more than \$7.5 million to 54 cities throughout its service area, Kallen said.

Notify assessor after property is destroyed

If your home is destroyed by fire, what happens to its taxable value — and to your property tax bill?

The property can be re-appraised and its taxable value adjusted, but only if you notify Clackamas County Assessor George Malin promptly.

Owners whose property is destroyed or damaged by fire or an "act of God," such as a flood, between Jan. 1 and July 1 have 30 days after the date of destruction or damage to notify the assessor. Malin will then make arrangements to re-appraise the property; its value, as of July 1, will be the basis for computing property tax due for the next year.
