

Assessor issues reminder

Persons buying a home after March 20, but prior to July 1 this year, have 30 days from the date of purchase to file for property tax relief. Claims must be filed with Clackamas County Assessor George Malin.

Under the state's property tax relief plan, the state pays part of the property taxes on qualified homes. The home

must be owner-occupied as of June 30 (temporary absence, such as vacation, is allowable) and the owner must have filed for relief.

Owners who have previously filed and are receiving relief do not have to refile. When property is sold, the new owner must file. If the use of the property changes, the owner must notify the assessor.

The filing deadline for those who purchased home before March 20 was April 1. Those purchasing after that date and before July 1 have the additional 30-day period to file.

Property tax relief is shown as a credit on the homeowner's tax statement in the fall. The state payment reduces the amount the owner has to pay.

State seems unwilling to pay more

State School Superintendent Verne Duncan said this week that last Tuesday's election results indicate that local property taxpayers aren't willing to pick up a greater share of education costs.

"There are some exceptions," Duncan said, "but most voters want property taxes held down regardless of state and federal cutbacks to education. They may realize that schools and community colleges are likely to

lose millions of state and federal dollars, but they don't think they should make up the difference."

The statewide performance was not as good as the March vote of one year ago. About 140 money measures were on the ballot. Most were school district requests for 'A' and 'B' levies to balance 1981-82 budgets. The 'A' levy is eligible for property tax relief; the 'B' ballot is not.

Incomplete results showed

that 42 of 64 district requesting approval of 'A' ballots were successful. Sandy Elementary School District was successful; Sandy Union High School District was not. 'B' levies saw 13 of 41 OK'd statewide. That's a 66 percent success ratio for 'A' ballots and 32 percent for 'B' ballots.

Last year, 80 percent of the 'A' levies won, while 45 percent of the 'B' levies were approved.

Legislation extends jobless benefits

Approximately 11,000 unemployed Oregon workers who have run out of unemployment benefits since the first of the year received a financial boost last week when Gov. Vic Atiyeh signed Senate Bill 409, extending up to 13 weeks the period they may draw jobless pay from the state Employment Division.

The bill became effective Monday, April 6.

The program is expected to cost the state \$7.6 million, most of which will come from the Oregon unemployment insurance trust fund. None of the funds will come from general state revenues and the increased benefits will probably not mean higher taxes for Oregon employers, Atiyeh said.

Those who will face additional expenses are so-called reimbursing employers — such as the state, most counties and municipalities — that elect to pay full cost of benefits to their separated employees in lieu of paying

taxes into the trust fund.

Atiyeh stressed that the bill, which was introduced by Sen. Jack Ripper, D-Coos Bay, at the governor's request, "is not a government give-away but a one-time on-

ly program designed to help those workers who are running out of benefits during the worst economic year since the recession of 1975, and who will be going back to work when the economy starts to pick up."

He pointed out that workers who exhausted their benefits prior to Jan. 1, will not qualify for the extension, and that no benefits will be paid under the bill after Oct. 3.

One-man show features pencil studies

Irving is an artist of inventiveness. His work in colored pencils, watercolors and acrylics produce a unique personal statement blending

these three media.

campus' Art Mall Theater. The talk will last approximately an hour and is free.
