Programs set for growers

Food production survey planned

Are you tired of rising food costs? Or would you like to help work for some constructive changes in the United States' food system?

The Rodale Press' Cornucopia Project is a study designed to gather information about ways of reducing waste, and shipping and energy inefficiency in the food production system.

Next Wednesday, April 22, at 7 p.m. in the Sandy Community School trailer, area residents will have the opportunity to take part in the

project's national survey and offer suggestions about retrofitting the food production system.

According to "The Cornucopia Project Newsletter," for every \$2 we spend on energy to grow food, we spend another dollar on energy to move it around.

"Transportation is not the only villain," the newsletter continues. "Processing and packaging food in the U.S. uses as much energy as do the farms that produce our

food. In 1979, a 44-cent can of California tomatoes contained 5 cents worth of tomatoes and 20 cents worth of processing. The rest went to transportation, overhead and profit."

By growing one's own food or purchasing food that is grown closer to home you can save money and energy.

The most basic way to lessen your food bill is grow what you eat. According to a national poll, 43 percent of American households had

backyard gardens in 1980. The vegetables from an average garden were worth \$441 and resulted in savings of nearly 10 percent on the average food bill for backyard gardeners.

Next Wednesday's meeting will offer an opportunity for area residents to analyze their home food production system, share ideas and offer a few suggestions for others interested in eliminating waste from their food bills.

Country market debuts soon

The Sandy Country Market, featuring crafts and fresh local produce, will have its grand opening Saturday, May 30.

Country markets are springing up across the nation as an alternative to high-priced produce which is shipped in from points around the country. It has been documented in government studies that consumers pay less while growers receive more money for their produce, according to local sponsors.

Area gardeners and farmers will now have this

opportunity, they say. Under the umbrella of the Sandy Community School, a group of local growers, crafts people and consumers have met since January to shape their wishes for a country market into concrete plans.

The ability to make the announcement of the start-up attests to the determination of area residents who have had this dream for several years.

An informal tailgate-type market has always seemed the logical way to turn excess produce into extra cash,

they say. The group wants to present high-quality produce and crafts at reasonable prices to area consumers.
